BIOLOGY

Please note: The policy on first class session attendance is strictly enforced.

REGISTRATION FOR BIOLOGY COURSES

Online registration for all undergraduate Biology courses is no longer restricted to students who have officially declared biology as a major. Seats will be available on a first-come, first-served basis, so it is advisable for biology majors and minors to register as soon as possible during the Advance Registration periods as seats are limited.

PREREQUISITES WILL BE ENFORCED

The minimum prerequisite for all Department of Biology 300-level courses is BIO 201 and BIO 202 or equivalent. Some courses may have additional prerequisites. In order to register for BIO 150/201 (or any biology major or minor course) a student must have demonstrated proficiency in reading, writing, and math. A score of 6 on the Reading Placement Test, a score of 7 on the Writing Placement Test (or ELP-ESL-120 or ELP DEV-099) and a score of 30 on the Math Placement Test (or MATH-DEV-092) will satisfy this requirement. Students should note that BIO 150 is a co-requisite of BIO 201 and is required for ALL majors/minors beginning their biology coursework as of Fall 2007.

Students may register online for biology classes for which prerequisites have been met (completed with a grade of "C" or better). Class lists will be monitored and prerequisites checked during and after registration periods. Students who are registered for courses for which prerequisites have not been met with a grade of "C" or better will not be able to attend the course and are responsible for any financial consequences resulting from the necessity to withdraw. It is the student's responsibility to be aware of and comply with all Biology course prerequisites.

Students are advised to check the Biology Department bulletin board and display cases located outside of the Department office (S-358G) for information and/or changes in course scheduling. - Graduate students who have fulfilled prerequisites for NEIU courses (e.g., as part of Bachelor's degree) elsewhere.

Transfer students who have not had their transferred CS courses evaluated by the CS program advisor must do so prior to registering.

ENGLISH

The English Placement Test is required before enrollment in English 101, Writing I. A grade of C or better in ENGL 101 is prerequisite to advance to ENGL 102.

The prerequisite for General Education courses **ENGL 201, 202, and 203** is a grade of C or better in ENGL 101.

The prerequisite for all English Department 300-level courses is a grade of C or better in **ENGL 101 and ENGL 102**, plus 6 hours of 200-level literature/writing excluding General Education courses, or consent of instructor.

The prerequisite for all English Department creative writing courses is one of the following: **ENGL 235** (Intro to Creative Writing I), **ENGL 236** (Intro to Creative Writing II), or consent of instructor.

The prerequisite for all English Department 400-level courses is one of the following: Graduate standing, admission to a degree program in English, or written consent of instructor.

ENGL 410 - Literary Methods & Practice is required in first fall term for all literature track students.

FOREIGN LANGUAGES AND LITERATURES

1. **Some foreign language courses may be listed under "Foreign Languages and Literatures (FL)" rather than under a specific language.**
2. **"LIB 449"** denotes the Foreign Language Laboratory located on the 4th floor of the Library.
3. **Prerequisites for Spanish Literature courses:** Unless otherwise noted, the prerequisites for 300-level Spanish Literature courses are Spanish 317 and Spanish 329 or Consent of Instructor.
4. **SPAN 331-1 (Hispanic World Cultures)** will be taught as a hybrid course. Students will do a significant portion of the coursework online and will meet only periodically in a classroom setting.
5. **SPAN 101-2, SPAN 102-2 AND FREN-360Q-1** will be taught online. All of the instruction is administered through the Blackboard Learning Management System and textbook software. For further information, please contact the Instructor listed.
6. Students who have completed SPAN-103 are strongly encouraged to take SPAN-202 before enrolling in SPAN-224.

GEOGRAPHY AND ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES

JUSTICE STUDIES

JUST 312 Theories of Criminal Behavior

In the 2008-2009 Catalog, the prerequisite for this course is a misprint. The correct prerequisite is JUST 201 Introduction to the Criminal Justice System.

JUST 345 Practicum requires authorization by an advisor or the Department Chair. The following prerequisites must be completed before enrolling in Practicum: JUST 101, JUST 202, JUST 241, and JUST 301. Students should also have completed a minimum of two electives (six hours) in Justice Studies.

JUST 350 Field Work Seminar requires authorization by an advisor or the Department Chair. To be authorized students must have completed JUST 345 Practicum (and its prerequisites) and a minimum of four electives (12 hours) in Justice Studies. The Field Work Seminar includes a 200 hour internship, which should be arranged in advance, normally during the Practicum course.

MATHEMATICS

Successful completion of course prerequisites is required before registration is permitted. When manual verification of prerequisites is needed, a Course permission/authorization form is submitted to the Mathematics office S214B for processing. These forms are made available two weeks prior to advance registration and can be obtained from the Mathematics office S 214B or our department website www.neiu.edu/~math. Follow the instructions carefully.

In addition to NEIU coursework, prerequisites may also be met by qualifying transfer coursework, ACT or NEIU Math Placement scores. Prerequisites for Mathematics courses are accessible on NEIUport and can also be found in the most recent academic catalog.

MUSIC

All music majors should see their advisor every semester prior to registration.

New students entering in Fall 2009 will be required to meet the new requirements for the B.A. and M.A. degrees in music. All students who entered the program prior to Fall 2009 will follow their original program requirements with a few exceptions. See department advisors for details.

All music majors are required to attend Convocation. Dates are posted outside the department office.

Applied Music: Private Applied Lessons are available for Music Majors, Music Minors, or students in an Ensemble (i.e., University Chorus, Jazz Band, Concert Band, Opera Workshop, etc.). Authorization must be obtained from the instructor AND the department to register for Applied Music. Music Education majors take MUS 151 or 351 and Music Performance Majors take 152 or 352. There is a \$15.00 Special Fee for Applied Music.

In order to register for Applied Music, students must:

1. AUDITION and obtain PERMISSION from the instructor or Department Chair.
2. Submit approved AUTHORIZATION FORM to department office no later than the first week of class (allow 48 hours for processing)
3. Complete the on-line registration.

ACCEPTANCE INTO ENSEMBLES IS BY AUDITION.

A placement exam for Theory I will be given on the first day of class. Students who do not meet the minimum proficiency may be required to complete MUS-105 before registering for Theory I.

Music Education

A Piano Proficiency Exam is required of Music Education Majors. This exam is given during the semester; notices will be posted in the department. Music Education Majors must pass all sections of the Piano Proficiency Exam prior to enrolling in MUS 393L.

PSYCHOLOGY

PSYC 200 General Psychology is a self-paced course wherein students attend class (either section, any day) as needed to maintain an adequate pace of progress through the course requirements, seeking assistance and/or demonstrating mastery of the material. **The first two semester days of the class (Mon-Tues) are a mandatory course orientation.** Further information is available from the Department of Psychology Office (S-313F) or the PsychSpace groups page.

Courses that may be used to fulfill the major laboratory requirement in the Spring 2010 semester are PSYC 316 Lab: Child Development and PSYC 374 Lab: Research Methods in Psychology: Perception. Elective courses that may fulfill the major capstone requirement will be PSYC 395 History of Psychology, PSYC 300E Theories of Interpersonal Behavior and PSYC 363 Advanced Group Dynamics.

SOCIAL WORK

The following are the required Liberal Arts courses which are prerequisites to entering Social Work major courses beyond SWK 200 and SWK 207: ANTH 212, BIO 100, ECON 215, PSCI 216, PSYC 100, PSYC 110, and SOC 100.

The following courses are Knowledge and Values electives (formerly known as pre-practice) available for minors: SWK 203, SWK 250; SWK 314, and SWK 320. All minors must take and successfully complete SWK 200 & SWK 207.

Social Work majors must have completed all General Education requirements and Liberal Art courses prior to entering SWK 303/304, SWK 305/306, SWK 310/311, SWK 353/355, SWK 354/356, SWK 357 and Social Work Skill Elective courses (formerly known as Post-Practice electives). The Skill Elective course offered this semester is SWK 328. This course is offered for those in SWK 353/355 OR by permission of the Professor. SWK 320 is a cross listed course with Women Studies. SWK 314 is a cross listed course with African, African American Studies.

COLLEGE OF BUSINESS AND MANAGEMENT

WHO CAN ENROLL IN 300 LEVEL BUSINESS COURSES:

Students who intend to enroll in 300 level business courses **must first meet the following admission/declaration requirements of the College of Business and Management:**

A. Complete the eight College of Business and Management Foundation courses. Students must earn a grade point average of 2.50 or higher with no grade below a "C" for all courses, including Foundation Courses, applied to a business major or minor. The Foundation Courses are: ENGL 101 (Writing I), ENGL 102 (Writing II), MATH 165 (Finite Math), MATH 167 (Business Calculus), ECON 217 (Microeconomics), BLAW 285 (Legal Environment of Business), ACTG 201 (Introduction to Financial Accounting) and ACTG 202 (Introduction to Managerial Accounting). Note: Enrollment in BLAW 280 and BLAW 285 requires completion of at least 30 credit hours.

B. Complete at least 60 credit hours (including the Foundation Courses) of course work and have a cumulative GPA of 2.00 or better for these hours. (For business minors a 2.00 cumulative GPA in at least 45 credit hours is required.)

C. Must have completed all General Education requirements

ALL 400 and 500 LEVEL BUSINESS AND MANAGEMENT COURSES:

These are graduate level courses. Consult the Academic Catalog for special admission and registration policies that apply to them.

PREREQUISITES WILL BE ENFORCED:

Please Note: Prerequisites are cumulative; i.e., some prerequisites have prerequisites of their own that must also be successfully completed prior to enrolling in a course. Students are expected to complete those courses with a "C" or better. Incomplete grades and "D" grades in prerequisite courses do not constitute successful completion. Students must not register for 300 level business courses unless they have met all prerequisites and requirements to declare a business major or minor. This includes a 2.50 GPA in the Foundation Courses.

All students, including students at large, are responsible for complying with the published prerequisites and other registration requirements. Class registration lists will be monitored and checked. Students who register for courses for which prerequisites have not been met will be responsible for any financial consequences due to their subsequent necessity to withdraw. Note that a student may advance register for a course in an upcoming semester while enrolled in a prerequisite course in the current semester, but must complete the prerequisite with a "C" or better to remain registered for the upcoming semester.

Students who have taken prerequisite courses at other institutions must have their transcripts evaluated by the Office of Program Advisement in the College of Business and Management. If students have not already done so, they should consult with the Program Advisors immediately.
