The College of Arts and Sciences Education Program (CASEP) is a pre-service education learning community for students who are interested in becoming Pre-K-12 teachers. CASEP offers students the opportunity to begin their teacher training their first semester of college rather than their third year of college. Students accepted to Northeastern Illinois University are eligible to apply to CASEP. CASEP classes are linked and/or co-taught and help satisfy General Education requirements. In addition, CASEP has its own counselor to help guide you through your critical first two years of college. Also, as a first year CASEP participant you will have the opportunity to observe in elementary and high school classrooms alongside practicing teachers.

BIOLOGY

Please note: The policy on first class session attendance is strictly enforced.

REGISTRATION FOR BIOLOGY COURSES

Online registration for all undergraduate Biology courses is no longer restricted to students who have officially declared biology as a major. Seats will be available on a first-come, first-served basis, so it is advisable for biology majors and minors to register as soon as possible during the Advance Registration periods as seats are limited.

PREREQUISITES WILL BE STRICTLY ENFORCED

The minimum prerequisite for all Department of Biology 300-level courses is BIO 150, BIO 201, and BIO 202 or equivalent. Some courses may have additional prerequisites. In order to register for BIO 150/201 (or any biology major or minor course) a student must have demonstrated proficiency in reading, writing, and math. A score of 6 on the Reading Placement Test, a score of 7 on the Writing Placement Test (or ELP-ESL-120 or ELP DEV-099) and a score of 30 on the Math Placement Test (or MATH-DEV-092) will satisfy this requirement. Students should note that BIO 150 is a co-requisite of BIO 201 and is required for ALL majors, minors, and transfer students effective Fall 2007. Students transferring in course equivalencies to BIO 201, or any other course(s) which satisfy biology major/minor requirements, must register for BIO 150 concurrently with their first-semester biology coursework.

Students may register online for biology classes for which prerequisites have been met (completed with a grade of "C" or better). Class lists will be monitored and prerequisites checked during and after registration periods. Students who are registered for courses for which prerequisites have not been met with a grade of "C" or better will not be able to attend the course and are responsible for any financial consequences resulting from the necessity to withdraw. It is the student's responsibility to be aware of and comply with all Biology course prerequisites.

Additionally, the Department of Biology reserves the right to place students registering for the same course three or more times on a waiting list. Seats are subject to availability during the latter part of late registration.

Students are advised to check the Biology Department bulletin board located outside of the Department office (BBH-358G) for information and/or changes in course scheduling. ENGLISH

The English Placement Test is required before enrollment in ENGL 101, Writing I. A grade of C or better in ENGL 101 is prerequisite to advance to ENGL 102, Writing II.

ENGL 101 CASEP section: see College of Arts & Sciences Education Program note above.

The prerequisite for General Education courses **ENGL 201, 202, and 203** is a grade of C or better in ENGL 101.

ENGL 210 WIP: Methods for English Majors: Registration for this course is restricted to declared English and English/Secondary Education majors or consent of instructor.

The prerequisite for all English Department 300-level courses is a grade of C or better in ENGL 101 and ENGL 102, plus 6 hours of 200-level literature/writing courses excluding General Education courses, or consent of instructor.

The prerequisite for all English Department 300-level creative writing courses is one of the following: ENGL 235 (Intro to Creative Writing I), ENGL 236 (Intro to Creative Writing II), or consent of instructor.

The prerequisite for all English Department 400-level courses is one of the following: Graduate standing, admission to a degree program in English, or written consent of instructor.

ENGL 410 – Literary Methods & Practice is required in first fall term for all literature track students

JUSTICE STUDIES

JUST 312 Theories of Criminal Behavior

In the 2010-2011 Catalog, the prerequisite for this course is a misprint. The correct prerequisite is either JUST 101 or JUST 201.

JUST 345 Practicum requires authorization by an advisor or the Department Chair. The following prerequisites must be completed before enrolling in Practicum: JUST 101, JUST 202, JUST 241, and JUST 301. Students should also have completed a minimum of three electives (nine hours) in Justice Studies. Four electives (12 hours) in Justice Studies are recommended.

JUST 350 Field Work Seminar requires that students have completed JUST 345 Practicum and its prerequisites, as well as a minimum of four electives (12 hours) in Justice Studies. The Field Work Seminar includes a 200-hour internship, arrangements for which should have been finalized in advance, normally during the JUST 345 Practicum course. **It is strongly advised that students do not wait until the beginning of the Field Work Seminar to secure their internship.** Ideally, students should discuss their internship arrangements with their Field Work Seminar instructor before the beginning of the course. Students must do the internship at the same time they are enrolled in the Field Work Seminar, not before.

LINGUISTICS

Linguistics 300-level courses that require certain prerequisites are open to students who have not met the prerequisites on an individual basis.

Linguistics 400-level courses that are restricted to Linguistics M.A. students are open to at-large students on a space available basis during Advanced and Open Registration.

MATHEMATICS

REMINDER!! The schedule printed here is subject to change. Please use the schedule on NEUport to get the most up-to-date information.

Successful completion of course prerequisites is required before registration is permitted. When manual verification of prerequisites is needed, a course permission form is submitted to the Mathematics office BBH-214B for processing. These forms are made available two weeks prior to advance registration and can be obtained from the Mathematics office or our department website www.neiu.edu/~math. Follow the instructions carefully.

In addition to NEIU coursework, prerequisites may also be met by qualifying transfer coursework, ACT or Math Placement scores. Prerequisites for Mathematics courses are accessible on NEUport and can also be found in the most recent academic catalog.

MUSIC

All music majors should see their advisor every semester prior to registration.

New students entering in Fall 2009 will be required to meet the new requirements for the B.A. and M.A. degrees in music. All students who entered the program prior to Fall 2009 will follow their original program requirements with a few exceptions. See department advisors for details. All music majors are required to attend Convocation. Dates are posted outside the department office.

Applied Music: Private Applied Lessons are available for Music Majors, Music Minors, or students in an Ensemble (i.e., University Chorus, Jazz Band, Concert Band, Opera Workshop, etc.). Authorization must be obtained from the instructor AND the department to register for Applied Music. Music Education majors take MUS 151 or 351 and Music Performance Majors take 152 or 352. There is a \$15.00 Special Fee for Applied Music.

In order to register for Applied Music, students must:

1. AUDITION and obtain PERMISSION from the instructor or Department Chair.
2. Submit approved AUTHORIZATION FORM to department office no later than the first week of class (allow 48 hours for processing)
3. Complete the on-line registration.

ACCEPTANCE INTO ENSEMBLES IS BY AUDITION.

A placement exam for Theory I will be given on the first day of class. Students who do not meet the minimum proficiency may be required to complete MUS-105 before registering for Theory I.

A Piano Proficiency Exam is required of Music Education Majors. This exam is given during the semester; notices will be posted in the department. Music Education Majors must pass all sections of the Piano Proficiency Exam prior to enrolling in MUS 393L.

Graduate Program

Participation in a large ensemble for a minimum of three terms is required (wind and percussion students enroll in Band; guitar students enroll in Guitar Ensemble; string students [violin, viola, cello, and string bass] enroll in Orchestra; voice students enroll in University Chorus, Opera Workshop, Chamber Singers, or Musical Theater; piano students enroll in Practicum Chamber Music, Piano Ensemble Four Hands, Accompanying, or other approved Instrumental Ensembles).

PSYCHOLOGY

PSYC 200 General Psychology is a self-paced course. Students will acquire knowledge of psychology content areas and develop the skills essential for success in our curriculum. Students must participate in in-class and online learning components and demonstrate mastery by passing a series of quizzes. Course grades are based on performance on exams, written assignments, and PL participation. **The first week of classes includes two mandatory orientation sessions:** You must attend one of the Mon/Tues sessions AND one of the Wed/Thurs sessions. Courses that may be used to fulfill the major laboratory requirement in the Fall 2011 semester are PSYC 308 Lab: Tests & Measurement and PSYC 361 Lab: Social Psychology. Elective courses that may fulfill the major capstone requirement are PSYC 395 History of Psychology and PSYC 396 Senior Seminar.

SOCIAL WORK

The following are the required Liberal Arts courses that are prerequisites to entering Social Work major courses beyond SWK 200 and SWK 207-Anth 212, Bio 100, Psych 100, Psych 110 and Soc 100.

The following courses are Knowledge and Values electives for minors and majors offered in fall 2011: SWK 203, SWK 208, SWK 250, SWK 301, and SWK 307. Please note the focus of SWK 250- Issues in Social Service Delivery is Social Work with African American Men. SWK 250 is a repeatable course as long as different topics are taken. SWK 301 will be offered as part of the CAST (Child Advocacy Services and Treatment) minor, CAST 303- Evaluation and Assessment in Child Advocacy.

Social Work majors must have completed all general education and liberal arts requirements prior to entering SWK 303/304/309. The Skill Elective courses fall 2011 are SWK 308, SWK 322 and SWK 327. SWK 327 will be taught as an Online Class. Skills electives are offered for those students who are in enrolled or have completed SWK 305/306/357 or by permission of the professor.

COLLEGE OF BUSINESS AND MANAGEMENT

WHO CAN ENROLL IN 300 LEVEL BUSINESS COURSES:

Students who intend to enroll in 300 level business courses **must first meet the following admission/declaration requirements of the College of Business and Management:**

A. Complete the eight College of Business and Management Foundation courses. Students must earn a grade point average of 2.50 or higher with no grade below a "C" for all courses, including Foundation Courses, applied to a business major or minor. The Foundation Courses are: ENGL 101 (Writing I), ENGL 102 (Writing II), MATH 165 (Finite Math), MATH 167 (Business Calculus), ECON 217 (Microeconomics), BLAW 285 (Legal Environment of (Business)), ACTG 201 (Introduction to Financial Accounting) and ACTG 202 (Introduction to Managerial Accounting). Note: Enrollment in BLAW 280 and BLAW 285 requires completion of at least 30 credit hours.

B. Complete at least 60 credit hours (including the Foundation Courses) of course work and have a cumulative GPA of 2.00 or better for these hours. (For business minors a 2.00 cumulative GPA in at least 45 credit hours is required.)

C. Must have completed all General Education requirements

ALL 400 and 500 LEVEL BUSINESS AND MANAGEMENT COURSES:

These are graduate level courses. Consult the Academic Catalog for special admission and registration policies that apply to them.

PREREQUISITES WILL BE ENFORCED:

Please Note: Prerequisites are cumulative; i.e., some prerequisites have prerequisites of their own that must also be successfully completed prior to enrolling in a course. Students are expected to complete those courses with a "C" or better. Incomplete grades and "D" grades in prerequisite courses do not constitute successful completion. Students must not register for 300 level business courses unless they have met all prerequisites and requirements to declare a business major or minor. This includes a 2.50 GPA in the Foundation Courses.

All students, including students at large, are responsible for complying with the published prerequisites and other registration requirements. Class registration lists will be monitored and checked. Students who register for courses for which prerequisites have not been met will be responsible for any financial consequences due to their subsequent necessity to withdraw. Note that a student may advance register for a course in an upcoming semester while enrolled in a prerequisite course in the current semester, but must complete the prerequisite with a "C" or better to remain registered for the upcoming semester.

Students who have taken prerequisite courses at other institutions must have their transcripts evaluated by the Office of Program Advisement in the College of Business and Management. If students have not already done so, they should consult with the Program Advisors immediately.
