#### REGISTRATION FOR BIOLOGY COURSES

Registration for all undergraduate Biology courses is no longer restricted to students who have officially declared biology as a major. Seats will be available on a first-come, first-served basis, so it is advisable for biology majors and minors to register as soon as possible during the Advanced Registration periods as seats are limited.

#### PREREQUISITES WILL BE ENFORCED

The minimum prerequisite for all Department of Biology 300-level courses is BIO 201 and BIO 202 or equivalent. Some courses may have additional prerequisites. In order to register for BIO 150/201 (or any biology major or minor course) a student must have demonstrated proficiency in reading, writing, and math. A score of 6 on the Reading Placement Test, a score of 7 on the Writing Placement Test (or ESL-120 or ELP-099) and a score of 3 on the Math Placement Test (or MATH-092) will satisfy this requirement. Students should note that BIO 150 is a corequisite of BIO 201 and is required for ALL majors/minors beginning their biology coursework as of Fall 2007.

Students may register for biology classes for which prerequisites have been met (completed with a grade of "C" or better). Class lists will be monitored and prerequisites checked during and after registration periods. Students who are registered for courses for which prerequisites have not been met with a grade of "C" or better will not be able to attend the course and are responsible for any financial consequences resulting from the necessity to withdraw. It is the student's responsibility to be aware of and comply with all Biology course prerequisites.

Students are advised to check the Biology Department bulletin board and display cases located outside of the Department office for information and/or changes in course scheduling. Students may also consult with the Biology secretaries, Tina Pennekamp or Jan Aigner, as well as the Department's website at <http://orion.neiu.edu/~biology>.

### CHEMISTRY

### COMPUTER SCIENCE

#### REGISTRATION FOR COMPUTER SCIENCE COURSES

Students may register for Computer Science courses for which prerequisites have been met (completed with a 'C' or better) without receiving prior authorization from the Computer Science Department. Important: Transfer students who have not had their courses evaluated by the CS program advisor must do so prior to registering.

**PREREQUISITES WILL BE ENFORCED.** Students are responsible for complying with CS course prerequisites. Students who register for courses for which prerequisites have not been met will be responsible for any financial consequences resulting from the necessity to withdraw. Note that a student may advance register for a fall course while enrolled in the prerequisite course in spring or summer, but must complete the prerequisite with a 'C' or better to remain registered. If the prerequisite course is not successfully completed, the student must withdraw from any course(s) for which it is a prerequisite. Students are advised to check the CS Department bulletin board located between room CLS-3053 and CLS-3057 for information or changes in course schedule, etc.

All students taking Computer Science courses at the level of CS 200 or above must take CS 201 during their first semester in the Computer Science Department. (CS 201 may be taken with or before CS 200.)

### EARTH SCIENCE

### ENGLISH

The English Placement Test is required before enrollment in English 101, Writing I. **PLEASE NOTE: Authorization for English 101 and 102 MUST be obtained in room CLS 2011 or by calling the department at (773) 442-5810 AT LEAST 24 hours prior to your assigned time to register via <http://neiuport.neiu.edu>.** If students who advance register DO NOT CONFIRM their enrollments, their authorization will be voided. A grade of C or better in ENGL 101 is prerequisite to advance to ENGL 102.

The prerequisite for General Education courses ENGL 201, 202, and 203 is one of the following: a grade of "C" or better in ENGL 101.

The prerequisite for all English Department 300-level courses is a grade of C or better in ENGL 101 and ENGL 102, plus 6 hours of 200-level literature/writing excluding General Education courses, or consent of instructor.

The prerequisite for all English Department Creative Writing courses is one of the following: ENGL 235 (Intro to Creative Writing I), ENGL 236 (Intro to Creative Writing II), or consent of instructor.

The prerequisite for all English Department 400-level courses is one of the following: Graduate standing, admission to a degree program in English, or written consent of instructor.

### FOREIGN LANGUAGES AND LITERATURES

1. **Some foreign language courses may be listed under "Foreign Languages and Literatures (FL)" rather than under a specific language.**
2. "LIB-451" denotes the Foreign Language Laboratory located on the 4th floor of the Library.
3. **Prerequisites for Spanish Literature courses:** Unless otherwise noted, the prerequisites for 300-level Spanish Literature courses are Spanish 317 and Spanish 329 or Consent of Instructor.
4. Students who have completed SPAN-103 are strongly encouraged to take SPAN-202 before enrolling in SPAN-224.

### GEOGRAPHY AND ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES

### LINGUISTICS

### JUSTICE STUDIES

JUST 345 Practicum requires authorization by an advisor or the Department Chair. The following prerequisite Justice Studies courses must be completed before enrolling in Practicum: JUST 101, JUST 202, JUST 241, and JUST 301. Students also should have taken a minimum of two electives (six hours) in Justice Studies before registering for Practicum.

JUST 350 Field Work requires authorization by an advisor or the Department Chair. Students must have completed all required courses listed above, including JUST 345 Practicum, plus 15 hours of Justice Studies electives before taking Field Work. This course includes a required 200 hour internship.

**MATHEMATICS**

**Permits verifying the course prerequisites have been met are required** for all 100-level courses before registration. Permits for Fall 2008 will be available beginning March 31, 2008 and can be obtained near the bulletin board near SCI 222 or outside the Mathematics offices SCI 214. You can also download the permit form from our website [www.neiu.edu/~math](http://www.neiu.edu/~math). Completed permits can be dropped off in a slot outside the Mathematics offices SCI 214A or faxed to the Mathematics Department at 773-442-5770. Allow 4 to 5 business days for processing. All processed permits can be picked up outside SCI 214 offices.

**Prerequisites:**

In addition to the following courses, prerequisites may also be met by qualifying ACT or Math Placement scores.

In order to register for MATH 112 Statistics in Daily Life, you must have a "C" or better in Math 092 (previously Math 102)

For MATH 113 Quantitative Reasoning, you must have a "C" or better in Math 092 (previously Math 102)

For MATH 141 College Math I for Teachers (formerly 108) you must have a "C" or better in Math 092 (previously Math 102)

For MATH 143 College Math II for Teachers (formerly 109) you must have a "C" or better in Math 092 (previously Math 102)

For MATH 163 Math Modeling with Elementary Functions for Business Students, you must have a "C" or better in Math 092 (previously Math 102). MATH 164 is the one credit hour seminar for those taking Math 163.

For MATH 165 Finite Mathematics (formerly 110) you must have a "C" or better in Math 104 or 163.

For MATH 167 Business Calculus (formerly 111) you must have a "C" or better in Math 104 or 163.

For MATH 177 Math Modeling with Elementary Functions for Science/Math majors, you must have a "C" or better in Math 092 (previously Math 102). MATH 178 is the one credit hour seminar for those students taking MATH 177.

For MATH 185 Precalculus (formerly 106) you must have a "C" or better in Math 104 or 177. MATH 186 is the one credit hour seminar for those students taking MATH 185.

For MATH 187 (formerly 107 Calculus D) you must have a "C" or better in Math 185; MATH 188 is the one credit hour seminar for those students taking MATH 187.

*Please note that MATH 165 (Finite Math) is no longer the prerequisite for Math 167 (Business Calculus).* If you are currently taking or have taken MATH 165 and passed with a "C" or better, you will need to take Math 167 to meet the College of Business and Management requirements. (Contact the COBM Office of Program Advisement CLS 0006 or 773-442-6111 for more information.)

**If you are currently taking or have already taken a Math 100-level and have passed with a "C" or better, you've completed your math competency requirement.**

Beginning with Summer 2008 all students wishing to use transfer credits to meet prerequisites for 200, 300 and 400 level math courses must obtain the approval of the Mathematics Department prior to registering. Contact the Mathematics Department prior to registration for more information. 773-442-5776.

**Intermediate Algebra is now MATH 092-** previously it was Math 102 which no longer exists. Since Fall 2006, it is being offered through the Math Developmental Office and, if taken from that time forward, will **not** count as hours toward graduation. **Permits for MATH 090, 091 OR 092 can be obtained from the Developmental Math Office SCI 204B.**

Also, it is important to attend the first class session per the policy on first class session attendance

For the most up-to-date information, please check the bulletin boards near SCI 222 or contact the Mathematics Department at 773-442-5776 or 5760 for assistance.

**MUSIC**

All music majors are required to attend Convocation. Dates are posted outside the department office. All Music Majors must see their academic advisor every semester prior to registration.

**Applied Music** Private Lessons in voice, piano, and other instruments are available for Music Majors, Music Minors, or students in an Ensemble (i.e., University Chorus, Jazz Band, Concert Band, Opera Workshop, etc.). Authorization must be obtained from the instructor AND the department to register for Applied Music (1, 1.5, or 2 credit hours available). There is a \$15.00 Special Fee for Applied Music.

In order to register for Applied Music, students must:

1. AUDITION and obtain PERMISSION from instructor
2. Submit approved AUTHORIZATION FORM to department office no later than the first week of class (allow 48 hours for processing)
3. Register online via <http://neiuport.neiu.edu>.

ACCEPTANCE INTO ENSEMBLES IS BY AUDITION.

Placement exam for Theory I will be given on the first day of class. Students who do not meet the minimum proficiency may be required to complete MUS-105 before registering for Theory I.

**Music Education**

A Piano Proficiency Exam is required of Music Education Majors. This exam is given during the semester; notices will be posted in the department. Music

Education Majors must take the Piano Proficiency Exam prior to enrolling in MUS 393L and pass the exam prior to student teaching. Music Education Majors should consult course listings under the College of Education for SCED 303L, SCED 303V and SCED-305N.

**PSYCHOLOGY**

PSYC 200 General Psychology is a self-paced course wherein students attend class (either section, any day) as needed to maintain an adequate pace of progress through the course requirements, seeking assistance and/or demonstrating mastery of the material. **The first two semester days of the class (Mon-Tues) are a mandatory course orientation.** Further information is available from the Department of Psychology office (S-313F) or the Psychology Department webpage.

Courses that may be used to fulfill the major laboratory requirement in the Fall 2008 semester are PSYC 360: Social Psychology and PSYC 331: Personality. Elective courses that may fulfill the major capstone requirement will be PSYC 396: Senior Seminar (Art and Psychology) and PSYC 300B: Culture and Human Development

Note, Psychology Minors only: A strongly recommended substitute for the 202 Statistics requirement is PSYC 301: Research Methods in the Social Sciences. Majors may not use this substitution. 301 will be a substitute for 202 in all pre-requisites except for 302.

**SOCIAL WORK**

The following are the required Liberal Arts courses which are prerequisites to entering Social Work major course beyond SWK 200 and SWK 207: Anth 212, BIO 100, ECON 215, PSCI 216, PSYC 100, and SOC 100.

The following courses are knowledge and Values electives (formerly known as pre-practice) are available for minors: SWK 203, SWK 250, SWK 307, SWK 320 (formerly taught as 360J) and SWK 208. Social Work majors must have completed all General Education requirements prior to entering SWK 303/304, SWK 305/306, SWK 310/311, SWK 353/355, SWK 354/356, SWK 357 and Social Work Skill Elective courses (formerly known as Post-Practice electives). The Skill Elective course offered this semester is SWK 327. This course is offered for those in SWK 353/355 OR by permission of the Professor. SWK 320 is a cross listed course with Women Studies.

## COLLEGE OF BUSINESS AND MANAGEMENT

### WHO CAN ENROLL IN 300 LEVEL BUSINESS COURSES:

Students who intend to enroll in 300 level business courses **must first meet the following admission/declaration requirements of the College of Business and Management:**

A. Complete the eight College of Business and Management Foundation courses. Students must earn a grade point average of 2.50 or higher with no grade below a "C" for all courses, including Foundation Courses, applied to a business major or minor. The Foundation Courses are: ENGL 101 (Writing I), ENGL 102 (Writing II), MATH 165 (Finite Math), MATH 167 (Business Calculus), ECON 217 (Microeconomics), BLAW 285 (Legal Environment of Business), ACTG 201 (Introduction to Financial Accounting) and ACTG 202 (Introduction to Managerial Accounting). Note: Enrollment in BLAW 280 and BLAW 285 requires completion of at least 30 credit hours.

B. Complete at least 60 credit hours (including the Foundation Courses) of course work and have a cumulative GPA of 2.00 or better for these hours. (For business minors a 2.00 cumulative GPA in at least 45 credit hours is required.)

C. Must have completed all General Education requirements

### ALL 400 and 500 LEVEL BUSINESS AND MANAGEMENT COURSES:

These are graduate level courses. Consult the Academic Catalog for special admission and registration policies that apply to them.

### PREREQUISITES WILL BE ENFORCED:

**Please Note:** Prerequisites are cumulative; i.e., some prerequisites have prerequisites of their own that must also be successfully completed prior to enrolling in a course. Students are expected to complete those courses with a "C" or better. Incomplete grades and "D" grades in prerequisite courses do not constitute successful completion. Students must not register for 300 level business courses unless they have met all prerequisites and requirements to declare a business major or minor. This includes a 2.50 GPA in the Foundation Courses.

All students, including students at large, are responsible for complying with the published prerequisites and other registration requirements. Class registration lists will be monitored and checked. Students who register for courses for which prerequisites have not been met will be responsible for any financial consequences due to their subsequent necessity to withdraw. Note that a student may advance register for a course in an upcoming semester while enrolled in a prerequisite course in the current semester, but must complete the prerequisite with a "C" or better to remain registered for the upcoming semester.

Students who have taken prerequisite courses at other institutions must have their transcripts evaluated by the Office of Program Advisement in the College of Business and Management. If students have not already done so, they should consult with the Program Advisors immediately.

### MATHEMATICS DEVELOPMENT

#### AN IMPORTANT NOTE FOR MATH 090, MATH 091, & MATH 092

A permit authorization for your registration in MATH 090, MATH 091, and MATH 092 is necessary before NEUport Registration. Permits will only be issued after MATHACT scores are on file or after Math Placement Testing has been completed. Contact the Assessment & Testing Office, regarding Math Placement Testing, Room D-130, 773-442-5290. Placement Testing should be completed at least two weeks prior to a permit request. Placement results are obtained from Academic Advising, D 130.

After Math Placement has been completed and course work has begun, a final grade of C or higher is the prerequisite to advance to the next course.

Permits for NEUport Registration will be issued beginning Friday, April 11th. Students that are currently enrolled in developmental math courses will request their permit through their classroom instructor. All other students can obtain their permit application from the Math Development Office, Science Building, 204-B. Permit applications are available from the door of S 204 B and can be submitted at any time. If the office is closed, please slide your completed permit application form under the door of Science S-204 B. Please pick up your processed form from the permit folders by S-204 B, 48 hours after submission to confirm your class authorization. Permits can also be submitted by e-mail, if you are not currently enrolled in a math course, to: [t-blackburn1@neiu.edu](mailto:t-blackburn1@neiu.edu), please include your name, university id, course #, section number, CRN and pre-requisite. Only staff at El Centro and the Center for Inner Studies can issue permit authorizations for developmental math courses at their locations.

Permits MUST be obtained AT LEAST 48 hours prior to NEUport Registration. Students can complete their NEUport Registration through Late Registration. Your final opportunity to obtain a permit for Late Registration is on Wednesday, August 20th, from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., Science, S 204 B.

**Permit authorizations are voided before the first day of class, Saturday, August 23rd.**

## COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

### TEACHER EDUCATION

Students must check the university academic catalog for specific requirements for College of Education Admission and departmental/program policies regarding course prerequisites and field experience course work. Students who do not have the required prerequisites will be administratively withdrawn from courses.
