This semester's workshops cover a broad range of topics in instructional technology, integration of writing, and course development. We are also available to customize certain workshops to individual departments if department chairs have such requests. Also back by popular demand is **Dr. Robert Lucas** from the Institute for Scholarly Productivity in California. His workshop on *Scholarly Writing* last spring was so popular that we had to open a long waiting list for those not having reserved a space within the first few days after the workshop announcement. What is the Center for Teaching & Learning?

The CTL is four years old, which means that it is still a relatively young office on campus. For those who still wonder who we are and what we do, here is a short description. The Center's primary mission is to support and promote faculty in their roles as teachers. We believe that there are certain general features of good teaching—establishing and communicating clear learning outcomes, actively involving students in learning, and evaluating performance in ways that accurately reflect goals—which are common to all disciplines. Essential to the support of good teaching is the enhancement of faculty success at any career stage and the promotion of collegiality. The Center provides a safe place for consultation, reflection, or debate, while functioning as a source of leadership and expertise. We support faculty in their life-long learning about teaching through curriculum development, teaching strategies, technology use, and classroom and program assessment.

What Resources can I find at the CTL?

The Center maintains a website (www.neiu.edu/~ctl/) with select resources that we have either created or carefully reviewed and found worth recommending. You can find a document of 1-2 page *Teaching Tips* (under Curriculum and Teaching); a *Manual* of relevant campus policies and procedures for faculty (under New Faculty); a *Guide* to support-offices for teaching, learning, and research at NEIU (also under New Faculty); *Advice* and events for department chairs (under Academic Leaders); info on how to apply for or use Blackboard; *Program Assessment* information; a listing of all the books on college teaching in the CTL library (under Print Resources); and much more.
