1. Using the Table of Contents

If the Bookmarks sidebar is not visible, go to the menu titled "Window" and select the item "Show Bookmarks". Click on the bookmark titled "Table of Contents" and you will go to the Table of Contents for the printed publication. Each of the topics listed there are "linked" to the specific page where that information can be found. You can then use the scroll bars to move about the page and the magnifying glass to zoom in and out. You can then go back to the "Table of Contents" bookmark to return to the Table of Contents to select a new topic to move to.

2. Using Outlined Links

As you move through this document, you will see blocks of text outline with a dotted line. This dotted line is another method of linking the recommended location mentioned in the text where you can find additional information that may be of interest to you. By placing your cursor inside the outline and clicking you will be moved to page(s) referenced there.

Former Students

Students who have previously registered at Northeastern Illinois University are eligible to register if they meet requirements outlined below.

Students who have been dropped for poor scholarship from Northeastern must be readmitted to the university by the Committee on Academic Standards. Students must submit a written letter of petition, the university admission application and a \$25 non-refundable application fee to the Registrar. **Please do not send cash.** All documents must be received by March 15, 2006.

New Students

Students who have never enrolled at Northeastern Illinois University are classified as new students. All new students must complete a university application and be admitted prior to registration. The university application, non-refundable fee and supporting documents must be submitted in accordance with application deadlines.

Undergraduate Students

Former undergraduates in good academic standing pursuing a bachelor's degree are eligible to register if they have enrolled during the Summer 2005, Fall 2005, or Spring 2006 semester. Students who have not attended during any of the above semesters must reapply for admission.

New students wishing to pursue a bachelor's degree must apply by the application deadlines.

An application and all supporting documents must be submitted by the published admission deadlines. A non-refundable application fee of \$25 must be submitted with your application.

Students-at-large without degree

Former students who have previously enrolled at Northeastern Illinois University as students-at-large without degree are eligible to register. If you have attended as a student-at-large and want to remain in this status, you do not need to reapply.

New students wishing to apply as students-at-large without degree must apply by the application deadlines.

Students-at-large are not eligible to receive financial aid.

Students who have graduated from Northeastern Illinois University are considered graduate Students-at-Large and do not need to apply as a graduate Student-at-Large.

Students-at-Large with degree

Students who have previously enrolled at Northeastern Illinois University as students-at-large with degree are eligible to register. If you have attended as a student-at-large and want to remain in this status, you do not need to reapply.

New students wishing to apply as students-at-large with degree must apply by the application deadlines.

Students-at-large are not eligible to receive financial aid.

NORTHEASTERN ILLINOIS UNIVERSITY Tuition Guarantee Plan

In 2003, the Illinois General Assembly amended the Northeastern Illinois University Act to include a four-year tuition guarantee for new undergraduate students beginning with the Fall 2004 semester. The purpose of the Act is to assist students and their families, at the beginning of the college experience, to be aware of what the costs of college tuition will be for the next four years. The Tuition Guarantee Plan applies to all newly enrolled undergraduate students, including transfers, and guarantees the same tuition rate for four continuous academic years. The Tuition Guarantee Plan applies only to tuition. The Tuition Guarantee Plan does not apply to fees.

Tuition Guarantee Plan Classification

For each student, the Tuition Guarantee Plan begins with the first term of enrollment. Under the Tuition Guarantee Plan, the tuition rate for new undergraduate students first enrolling at NEIU in the Fall 2004, or thereafter, will be held constant for four continuous academic years.

New Students - The Tuition Guarantee Plan applies to all newly enrolled undergraduate students (freshman, transfers, and students-at-large) seeking their first bachelor's degree beginning with the Fall semester 2004, or thereafter, and will be effective for four continuous academic years. Newly enrolled is defined as undergraduate students seeking their first bachelor's degree and registered for at least one class on or after the first day of the term, whether or not they confirm their registration by payment or by applying financial aid. The four-year tuition guarantee expires at the end of the term (Fall, Spring, or Summer) immediately preceding the four-year anniversary of the student's initial enrollment. (For example, students who enter the Summer 2006 semester will be guaranteed their tuition through the Spring 2010 term).

Readmitted Students - Students who withdraw for any reason, other than being called up for active military service, and re-enroll will retain the guarantee rate they had when they withdrew from the university. The tuition guarantee will not be extended as a result of withdrawal.

Full-time or Part-time - The determination of eligibility for the Tuition Guarantee Plan is not affected by full-time or part-time enrollment status; all new undergraduates are included.

Students Changing Majors - The Tuition Guarantee Plan expiration date will not change for students changing their major.

Students Whose Guarantee Expires - The Tuition Guarantee Plan will expire after four continuous years following initial enrollment, or upon completion of a bachelor's degree, whichever comes first.

GRADE REPORTING SERVICES FOR STUDENTS

Semester grades will be available via the Internet (www.neiu.edu) by clicking on Admissions, Records, Grades & Financial Aid; Registration, Grades & Records and scrolling to Accessing Grades. Grades will be available beginning three days after the deadline to submit grades. Grades will only be available for the semester just ended. **Semester grades will not be mailed to students.**

You will be required to enter your Social Security number and your 4-digit PIN (used for the Touchtone Telephone Registration System) to access your grades. Detailed instructions are available at the Enrollment Services Center.

Students who need a printed copy of their semester grades for tuition reimbursement may obtain one by mailing a request to the Records Office, faxing a request to 773-442-4020 or by presenting photo identification to the Enrollment Services Center.

HELPFUL HINTS

- Listen carefully. If you do not understand the voice prompt the first time, listen again. Each voice prompt will be repeated three times before TTRS hangs up, so take your time and listen.
- **If you call TTRS and the system rings more than 3 times, the system is busy. Hang up and call again.**
- Keep your assigned PIN (Personal Identification Number) confidential. **Your PIN will not change.**
- If you attempt to call before your scheduled time, you will **NOT** be given access to TTRS and you will tie up the lines for students who are legitimately scheduled to register.
- After each added course has been entered:
The TTRS will repeat the course and section number, then ask you to press **1** if correct; or the system will deny the entry and will provide the reason for the denial. If you have already obtained permission and are being denied entry into the course, **you must contact the department to resolve the problem.**
- Listen carefully to the course information that is repeated. Make sure that your schedule is correct. If it is not, call TTRS again, select option one to register or make an adjustment, and then take the appropriate action to correct your schedule.
- After adding or dropping courses, TTRS will automatically recite your schedule followed by tuition and fee information. Listen for tuition and fee information. Questions concerning this information must be directed to the Cashier's Office.
- If you have a hold on your record, you will not be permitted to register or make an adjustment to your schedule until the hold has been removed or waived by the originating office. If you attempt to register by TTRS before the hold is removed or waived, the voice response will indicate which office to contact. You should contact that office during their office hours.
- The registration notice will indicate if advisement is required prior to registration. You will not be permitted to register or make an adjustment to your schedule until you meet with your advisor and the hold is removed.
- All students wishing to audit a course must submit written approval from the instructor to the Enrollment Services Center by the deadline.
- Some portable or cellular telephones cannot communicate with TTRS. If you call TTRS and the system repeats a correct number as "invalid" hang up and use a corded telephone.
- Touchtone telephones are available in the Student Lounge at no charge to the student.

GLOSSARY OF REGISTRATION TERMS

AUTHORIZATION FILE - A file maintained by the academic departments which indicates whether a student has been given permission to register for a course which is closed or restricted. Authorization for the course does not constitute registration. It is the student's responsibility to register.

CONFIRM WITH CASHIER - To guarantee/confirm the student's registration with the Cashier's Office by the payment due date for each registration period. Confirmation must occur whether students are receiving financial aid, have a scholarship, or are paying with a credit card, check, or cash.

PIN - Your assigned four-digit Personal Identification Number which is needed in order to register or make an adjustment to your schedule via the Touchtone Telephone Registration System. **Your PIN will not change. Your PIN will also be required to access term grades.**

REFERENCE NUMBER - The five-digit number which uniquely identifies a particular course section.

RESTRICTED COURSE - A course that requires authorization which must be obtained prior to registering for class. Refer to the schedule of classes or department for additional information.

RESTRICTION - A condition that prevents registration which must be resolved prior to registering or making an adjustment to your schedule (e.g. Academic Advisement).

VERIFY - To assure that the action the student has chosen (i.e. adding a course, dropping a course, putting a course on pass/fail, or completely withdrawing) should be processed, thereby updating the student's registration record.

TTRS ADVANCE AND OPEN REGISTRATION (773) 588-NEIU (6348)

All continuing students and newly admitted SUMMER 2006 students who received letters of admission prior to March 1, 2006 will be expected to call the Touchtone Telephone Registration System (TTRS) to register during Advance or Open Registration. **You must refer to your Touchtone Telephone Registration Notice to determine your earliest date and time to register. (The schedule below lists only the general dates set aside for each student classification to register for classes.)** You may call the Touchtone Telephone Registration System anytime after your earliest date and time to register through the last day for your student classification. **Please do not call unless it is your time to register or you will tie up the lines for those who are legitimately scheduled to register.**

Confirmation Process:

To guarantee the registration of classes, all students must confirm their registration with the Cashier's Office by the initial payment due date whether or not a bill is received. Failure to confirm by the due date will result in cancellation of registration. Students confirming their registration are responsible for the full tuition cost unless they officially withdraw by the established drop dates. **All students must confirm their registration with the Cashier's Office including students with financial aid, scholarship, or students with a credit or zero account balance.** The following are confirmation methods:

Method I: Pay the entire cost of the registered classes, or pay the minimum, which is the initial payment amount and a \$10 deferred payment fee by mail, drop box or in person. See Schedule of Tuition and Fee Payments Table for the initial payment amount.

Method II: Payment may be made with Visa or Mastercard by phone during normal business hours at 773-442-5170.

Method III: If you have a credit or zero account balance, you can confirm your registration (tuition and fees) using TTRS. For information, see page 10.

Note: If your financial aid is not reflected, please contact the Financial Aid Office before confirming your classes.

Return Check Policy:

A \$15 fee will be assessed for each returned check received by the university. After two occurrences, the student will be precluded from making a payment by check for the next two years (three years after the third occurrence). The student has a right to appeal the length of time with the Bursar.

Petitions For Reinstatement:

Those students whose class(es) were dropped because they did not confirm their Late and Change of Registration, may submit a petition to be reinstated to the class(es) within the first ten days of classes after the payment confirmation date. Students who had courses dropped because they did not confirm their Advance or Open Registration and did not re-register during Late and Change of Registration are not eligible to petition for reinstatement. Students may petition once during their attendance at Northeastern. Students who petition more than once will be denied, unless university error or extreme hardship is involved. Extreme hardship includes the death or serious injury of a parent, spouse, or child, or serious illness of the student, making it impossible to meet the payment deadline. Petitions may be obtained at the Enrollment Services Center. The student will need to pay the \$25 petition fee and the initial payment amount upon submission of the petition. **Note, students will be reinstated to all courses from which they were dropped.** The deadline for students to petition for reinstatement and **not** have to pay for the courses they are **not** attending is May 31 for Summer IA, June 1 for Summer IB and July 12 for Summer II. Students not attending a class will be dropped with a grade of "W". No petitions will be accepted after June 15 for Summer IA and Summer IB and July 27 for Summer II for Late and Change of Registration.

Outstanding Tuition and Emergency Loan Balances:

In order for the university to continue to provide an affordable education, it is important for the student to meet his/her financial commitment. However, students who have not met their financial obligation are subject to the following:

1. The student may not be allowed to register for classes.
2. Transcripts and diplomas will not be released.
3. The student's account will be charged a \$50.00 non-refundable outstanding balance fee.
4. The student's account will be assigned to private collection agencies.
5. The student's account will be reported to the State of Illinois Comptroller.

Limited financial aid is available for the Summer. Minimum enrollment eligibility is 5 credit hours combined for Summer I and Summer II.

- Pell Grants are available based on the remaining usage from the 05-06 award (i.e. less than full time attendance in 05-06 or only one semester attended). Students who plan to graduate in August 2006 or December 2006 may use their 2006-2007 Pell Grant during Summer 2006.
- Federal SEOG, Federal Perkins Loans and Federal Work Study will be awarded to earliest eligible 2006-2007 applicants as funds are available.
- No Federal Loan Programs (Stafford, PLUS) can be processed for Summer.

REFUND CHECKS

All refund checks must be picked up **in person** and require 2 forms of identification:

A NEIU Student ID (mandatory)
Any other photo ID

Refunds will be processed beginning June 9, 2006 for Summer IA and IB and July 14, 2006 for Summer II at 1:00 p.m.

COMPLETE WITHDRAWALS/RETURN OF TITLE IV FUNDS POLICY
for Financial Aid Recipients

Students who completely withdraw* from all classes through the 60 percent point of the term must repay a portion of financial aid funds received. The amount you repay will be based on the amount of time you attended classes. In most cases, you are entitled to keep the percent of aid that equals the amount of time you attended the term. For example, if you completely withdraw from classes at the 30% point of the term, you can keep 30% of your financial aid and would need to repay up to 70% of the aid you received.

NEIU will return these funds to the U.S. Department of Education (for Pell Grants, SEOG Grants or Perkins Loans) or to your lender (for Federal Stafford Loans) and will charge your student account. Students must make arrangements to repay any amounts owed before allowed to enroll again at NEIU or receive additional Title IV funds.

*NEIU considers that you are completely withdrawn from classes on the day you drop your last class using the Touchtone Telephone Registration System (TTRS system). Students who do not attend classes and do not officially withdraw will be considered as having attended 50% of the term, and will be responsible for repaying 50% of all aid received.

On Campus Students are Northeastern enrolled students at any one of the following sites; Main Campus (5500 N. St. Louis), El Centro (3119 N. Pulaski), the Jacob H. Carruthers' Center for Inner City Studies (700 E. Oakwood), and the Chicago Teachers' Center (7700 N. Halsted). Courses taken at extension sites or off campus distance education courses are not assessed on-campus fees. A student who registers for both on-campus and extension courses will be assessed all appropriate on-campus fees.

Residency Determination: Evidence of resident status shall be submitted at the time of application for admission. A student may have his residency status reclassified at any time by the university on the basis of additional or changed information.

If the student is classified in error as a resident student, the change in tuition shall be applied to the

next term after reclassification. If the student is classified in error as a non-resident, the change in tuition shall be applicable to the term in which the reclassification occurs. A written claim for reconsideration must be filed within thirty calendar days from the date of assessment of tuition. For additional information refer to the current university catalog.

Residency Status for Assessment of Tuition

Adult Student (18 years or over): Must have been a bonafide resident of Illinois for a period of at least six consecutive months immediately preceding the beginning of any term of registration at the university. An adult who resides with parent(s) and has established and is maintaining a bonafide residency in Illinois will be regarded as a resident student.

Mandatory Fees

Mandatory fees do not apply to courses taken at most extension sites or off campus Distance Education courses. They are intended to enhance and facilitate many aspects of campus life to include the following:

Student Union Fee: Helps support the Student Union, which is the heart of the activity program on- campus. It is the scene of lectures, discussions, concerts, dances, meetings, and other activities. The facilities include food services, lounges, and meeting rooms.

Student Activity Fee: It is used to support the Student Government, student organizations and clubs, and the many activities, programs, media, and events sponsored by the above group.

Computer Resource Fee: It is dedicated to the enhancement of computer services available to students. Such purposes shall include the addition of computer workstations, additional "smart classrooms", and increased access to all the networks and communications highway currently in place as well as those to be built in the future. There will be an increased availability of staff to assist students in learning to take advantage of the new and evolving technologies.

Health Service Fee: The fee enables the university to provide assessment and care for a wide range of student health concerns.

Parking Fee: University students have three parking options: to participate in the Level II parking program, to participate in Level I parking, or to waive out of the parking program entirely. Students who choose to participate in Level II parking will be assessed the parking fee based on credit hours enrolled. Students who desire to participate in Level I must sign a waiver form to opt out of the Level II parking program and independently purchase a Level I parking permit (forms obtained in the Cashier's Office). Students that do not want to participate in the parking program must sign a waiver form to opt out of the program. Waiver forms are included with the bills and are also available in the Cashier's Office. Students who choose to participate in parking on campus must first confirm their classes and then register their vehicle online at www.neiu.edu/parking. Once a student permit has been issued it can be viewed online and coverage is effective immediately. All permits must be properly displayed within 7 business days from the mail-out/issue date.

Performing Arts Fee: Helps support university theatre and dance productions and musical concerts.

Campus Recreation Fee: This fee supports a comprehensive recreation program, including intramurals, wellness and fitness programs, aquatics, sport clubs and informal recreation.

Academic Enhancement Fee: This fee is dedicated to University renovation, improvement and upgrade of classrooms, laboratories and other academic space.

FULL-TIME UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS

All confirmed full-time undergraduates are automatically billed for Student Health Insurance regardless of any subsequent reduction/addition in credit hours that would change their status to part-time/full-time. Undergraduate students have the option to waive the health insurance by completing a health insurance waiver with proof of insurance no later than June 2, 2006 for Summer IA and IB and July 14, 2006 for Summer II. The health insurance cost is non-refundable after these deadlines.

Coverage begins on May 19, 2006 and continues to midnight August 28, 2006. Be aware that in order to avoid a lapse in coverage, insurance should be purchased each semester: Fall, Spring and Summer sessions. This should be done at the Cashier's Office at the time the tuition payment is made.

PART-TIME UNDERGRADUATE AND MASTER DEGREE STUDENTS

Undergraduate students with at least 6 credit hours and graduate students who wish to purchase student health insurance will need to pay the premium at the **Cashier's Office**. If dependent coverage is desired, the student must obtain an insurance application form at the Health Service Office located in E051.

ALUMNI COVERAGE

Graduates may continue their health insurance **only** for the term immediately following their graduation by contacting the Health Service Office (E-051) for an Application Form.

NON-REFUNDABLE

The Health Insurance fee is NOT REFUNDABLE after June 2, 2006 for Summer IA and IB and July 14, 2006 for Summer II.

CANCELLATION

Students who already have a hospital insurance plan that is equal to or better than the student plan, may complete a cancellation form and submit it to the Cashier's Office at the time of CONFIRMATION (first payment for the term).

Proof of coverage is required. Whether by mail or in person, the cancellation form MUST reach the Cashier's Office by June 2, 2006 for Summer IA and IB and July 14, 2006 for Summer II.

HANDICAP PARKING: Identified spaces in each lot.

Parking in the handicapped spots on campus requires the display of a valid level one or two University parking permit in conjunction with a state issued Persons with Disabilities license plate or hanging placard or a temporary NEIU Handicapped Parking placard.

The Student Health Services Office will issue temporary NEIU Handicapped Parking placards that are valid only for short term handicapped parking for up to three weeks. Remember that both the NEIU permit and the Persons with Disabilities plate/placard must be properly displayed when parked in a university handicapped spot. Please call Student Health Services at (773) 442-5800 with any questions.

MOTORCYCLES:

- Special motorcycle parking is available in Lot D and in the Parking Facility on levels two through five.
- User must purchase and display a valid NEIU motorcycle decal each semester.
- Purchase and distribution of special motorcycle/motor bike decals are available at the Parking Office.

REFUNDS:

All refunds are credited back to student's bill and given in accordance with University tuition deadline dates and percentages. Associated permits must be returned to the Parking Division in order to qualify for a student billed credit adjustment. Students who completely withdraw from classes must return their decal to the Parking Division at the time of withdrawal.

DAILY PARKING OPTIONS:

DAILY PARKING PASS: \$5.00 per day. Must be purchased on a daily as-needed basis from the **DAILY PERMIT MACHINE** located in the **H lot** (at the South end of campus in level II) or from the Parking Office located in the northeast side of the Parking Facility on the 1st floor.

PARKING METERS:

Parking meters have a 30 minute time limit. Parking permits are not valid at meters.

POLICY ON FIRST CLASS SESSION ATTENDANCE

Department instructors may reassign a student's seat in a class if the student does not attend the first class session and neglects to inform the instructor in advance of the intended absence. The student will be responsible for any financial consequence if the course is not dropped officially by the student via TTRS before the appropriate refund deadline. Failure to officially withdraw from class will result in a grade of F.

PASS/FAIL OPTION

- Pass/fail option is available only to students in good standing (can not be on academic probation) at the undergraduate level.
 - Pass/fail option is not allowed for General Education, Honors, College of Business & Management courses, tutored study courses, independent study courses, English 101, a course used to fulfill a major or minor requirement, or a course used to fulfill the Math Competency Requirement.
 - Students are eligible to exercise the pass/fail option only after accumulating fifteen hours in residency (courses taken through Northeastern).
 - Eligible students will be permitted one pass/fail course per term. A maximum of 18 pass/fail hours, including transfer courses from other institutions, may be applied toward graduation but may not be counted toward a student's major area of concentration, minor, or General Education Program.
 - Declaration of the intention to select the pass/fail option must be made no later than the tenth day of the term by using the Touchtone/Telephone Registration System (TTRS). The decision to select the pass/fail option may not be changed after that date.
 - A grade of "P" will be used to indicate that the student has passed the course, and a grade of "F" will be used to indicate that the student has failed the course. The "F" will be included in the grade point average.
 - Instructors may offer courses restricted to pass/fail registration with approval from the appropriate College Educational Policy Committee and by the Faculty Council on Academic Affairs, either at the time of initial course approval or subsequently. Hours of credit carried by such course(s) will be part of the maximum 18 hours which have been approved for the general pass/fail option.
- Additional information is available at the Enrollment Services Center or in the current Academic Catalog.

POLICY ON INCOMPLETES

- "I" (incomplete) may be given if a student is absent from the final examination or fails to complete a special research or individual study project because of some unavoidable circumstance such as illness.
 - Effective Spring 1995, a student must complete the work required to fulfill the Incomplete Contract according to the following timetable:

- Incompletes that have not been removed by the end of the designated Fall or Spring semester will become permanent if the student was performing satisfactory (A, B, or C) work at the time the "I" grade was issued. "I" grades for students who were not performing satisfactory (D or F) work will be changed to an "F" grade.
 - This policy does not apply to thesis seminars or masters project seminars.

CREDIT HOUR LOAD (OVERLOADS)

During the summer term, a student may register for a maximum of 14 credit hours. No student may carry a course overload during the first semester of study at Northeastern.

Approval for a course overload is required under the following conditions:

- An enrollment of more than 14 hours during Summer IB (13 week term).
- An enrollment of more than 14 hours distributed across Summer IA (6-1/2 week term), Summer IB (13 week term) and Summer II (6-1/2 week term).
- An enrollment of more than 7 hours during Summer IA (6-1/2 week term).
- An enrollment of more than 7 hours during Summer II (6-1/2 week term).

To be considered for a course overload students must:

- Have a cumulative GPA of 3.0.
- Pass the English Competency Exam by the student's fourth term of enrollment.
- Write a petition explaining the compelling reason the overload is necessary.
- Submit the letter of petition to the appropriate college Dean or Department.

Dean of the College of Arts & Sciences

- Undergraduates who have officially declared a major or pre-major in the College of Arts & Sciences
- Undergraduates who have not yet declared a major or pre-major
- Undergraduate and Graduate students-at-large

Dean of the College of Business & Management

- Undergraduates who have officially declared a major or pre-major in the College of Business & Management

Dean of the College of Education

- Undergraduates who have officially declared a major or pre-major in the College of Education
- Graduate students-at-large officially admitted to a certification program

Dean of the Graduate College

- Graduates admitted to a Masters degree program

Director of Non Traditional Degree Programs

- Undergraduates officially admitted to the Board of Governors/BA program or the University Without Walls program

The Dean's office may delete a course(s) from the student's record if permission is not granted.

ENROLLMENT VERIFICATION

When verifying enrollment for purposes of loan deferments and other programs that require full-time enrollment, the university reports full time/part time status in the following manner:

The student status is determined by the total number of enrolled Summer hours. Dates of attendance will be reported using the beginning and ending dates of the specific summer sessions the student is taking classes.

PREREQUISITE POLICY

- The student should note that some course descriptions refer to a prerequisite course that must be successfully completed before enrollment. The members of the faculty regard these prerequisites or their equivalent as a necessary foundation for student learning. Therefore, it is the student's responsibility to be aware of and follow any course prerequisite(s) prior to registration. In such case that a course prerequisite cannot be met, it is the responsibility of the student to obtain a written waiver of the prerequisite by following the procedure applicable in the college or department which sponsors the course.
- It is the right of the faculty to verify that students enrolled in their courses have met the appropriate prerequisite(s) or their equivalents. The faculty member may request the student to show verification of having met the prerequisites. In the event a faculty member determines that a student has not met the prerequisites and should not be permitted to continue in a course, the faculty member may initiate action to drop the student by notifying the Office of Enrollment Services.

Faculty members from the College of Business and Management shall refer the matter to the college's Program Advising Office, which will initiate course drop action as appropriate.

AUDITING

Students who meet the admission requirements of the University and are registered for a course may audit the course if they have written permission of the instructor. NOTE: Courses in the College of Business & Management must also obtain written permission of the chairperson. Deadline to submit an approved written request to the Office of Enrollment Services to audit a course is June 2 for Summer I and July 14 for Summer II.

AN AUDITOR CANNOT LATER HAVE HIS/ HER REGISTRATION CHANGED TO SECURE COURSE CREDIT. A student registered for credit may not change to audit after date listed above. Auditors pay the same fees as credit students.

Thesis seminar requires written consent of the Thesis advisor, department chairperson, dean of the College of Arts & Sciences, dean of the College of Business & Management, or dean of the College of Education, program coordinator/advisor, and the dean of the Graduate College on the Thesis Seminar form.

NOTE: All forms may be obtained from the department offering the course.

CONCURRENT REGISTRATION

Concurrent registration for undergraduates working toward a degree at Northeastern is permissible. Prior to enrolling at another university or college, the student at Northeastern must obtain written permission from his/her chairman/designated academic advisor, to be submitted to the Enrollment Services Center. All students wishing to take Business and Management courses must obtain permission from the College of Business and Management prior to submitting the form to the Enrollment Services Center. Official forms and information concerning procedures are available at the Enrollment Services Center. Failure to follow appropriate procedures may jeopardize the acceptance of credits earned at another university or college. The last 30 consecutive credit hours must be completed at Northeastern in order to meet graduation requirements.

COMMUNITY LISTENERS PROGRAM

The Community Listeners program is offered for self-enhancement to individuals who are not currently enrolled at Northeastern and are interested in taking college courses without receiving credit. There is no charge for participation in this program. Individuals select one class each semester from a schedule of Community Listeners classes that is predetermined by faculty. Class size, determined by the instructor, is limited and available on a first-come, first-served basis. Community Listener participants have access to the library with a validated registration form. An AA or AS degree from a community college meeting the standards of the 1991 Illinois Community College Board model General Education curriculum in Mathematics or completion of the Illinois General Education Core curriculum prior to transferring to Northeastern Illinois University. To meet the mathematics competency requirement a student must earn a grade of C or better in the mathematics course transferred from the college or university.

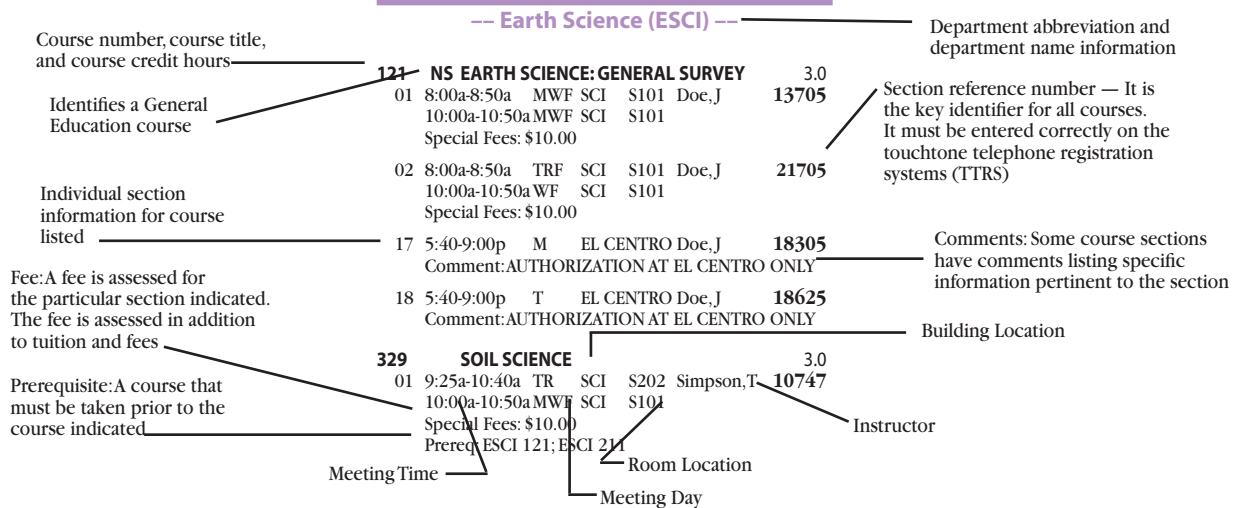

BIOLOGY

Please note: The policy on first class session attendance is strictly enforced.

REGISTRATION FOR BIOLOGY COURSES - NEW

During this summer semester, Touchtone registration for all undergraduate Biology courses will not be restricted to students who have officially declared biology as a major during the summer semester. Seats will be available on a first-come, first-served basis, so it is advisable for biology majors and minors to register as soon as possible during the Advance Registration period as seats are limited.

PREREQUISITES WILL BE ENFORCED

The minimum prerequisite for all Department of Biology (BIOL, BIOL-BOT, and BIOL-ZOOL) 300-level courses is six (6) credits in general biology (BIOL 102 and BIOL 103 or equivalent). Some courses may have additional prerequisites. It is the student's responsibility to be aware of and comply with all Biology course prerequisites.

Students may touchtone register for biology classes for which prerequisites have been met (completed with a grade of "C" or better). However, class lists will be monitored and prerequisites checked during and after registration periods. See the Prerequisite Policy in the current University Academic Catalog.

COMPUTER SCIENCE

REGISTRATION FOR COMPUTER SCIENCE COURSES

Students may touchtone register for Computer Science courses for which prerequisites have been met (completed with a 'C' or better) without receiving prior authorization from the Computer Science Department. Important: Transfer students who have not had their courses evaluated by the CS program advisor must do so prior to registering.

PREREQUISITES WILL BE ENFORCED. Students are responsible for complying with CS course prerequisites. See the Prerequisite Policy in the current University Academic Catalog. Note: a student may advance register for a summer course while enrolled in the prerequisite course in the spring, but must complete the prerequisite with a "C" or better to remain registered. Students are advised to check the CS Department bulletin board located between CLS 3053 and CLS 3057 for information or changes in course schedule, etc.

EARTH SCIENCE

Summer IA, 2006

ESCI 325G/ 41 - Seminar In Earth Science – Plate Collision Island Geology

This course includes a 10 day field trip to Greece: May 6- 16, 2006. Introduction to the study of plate collision island geology and associated ecosystems. Help explore extensive cave systems in a karst region. Study methods for reduction of non-point source pollution on Mediterranean beaches. Gain hands-on experience with field research methods, problem-solving and report writing. Learn about careers in environmental management and engineering. Approximate cost for the trip is \$1400. This includes housing, transportation and food. Tuition is additional. Permission of the instructor prior to registration is required.

Field Trip to Yellowstone National Park—A field trip to Yellowstone National Park in northwestern Wyoming is an optional but recommended part of this course. Vans will depart from Chicago on August 1 and return August 8. Lodging will include two nights in motels and camping at campgrounds (with showers) in Yellowstone. Cost per student will be approximately \$500.00 (over and above course tuition and student fees). This will cover food, transportation, lodging, and camping. COLLEGE OF BUSINESS AND MANAGEMENT**WHO CAN ENROLL IN 300 LEVEL BUSINESS COURSES:**

Students who intend to enroll in 300 level business courses **must first meet the following admission/declaration requirements of the College of Business and Management:**

A. Complete the eight College of Business and Management Foundation courses. Students must earn a grade point average of 2.50 or higher with no grade below a "C" for all courses, including Foundation Courses, applied to a business major or minor. The Foundation Courses are: ENGL 101 (Writing I), ENGL 102 (Writing II), MATH 110 (Finite Math), MATH 111 (Business Calculus), ECON 217 (Microeconomics), BLAW 285 (Legal Environment of (Business)), ACTG 201 (Introduction to Financial Accounting) and ACTG 202 (Introduction to Managerial Accounting). Note: Enrollment in BLAW 280 and BLAW 285 requires completion of at least 30 credit hours. Some of these courses have additional prerequisites.

B. Complete at least 60 credit hours (including the Foundation Courses) of course work and have a cumulative GPA of 2.00 or better for these hours. (For business minors a 2.00 cumulative GPA in at least 45 credit hours is required.)

C. Must have completed all General Education requirements

ALL 400 and 500 LEVEL BUSINESS AND MANAGEMENT COURSES:

These are graduate level courses. Consult the Academic Catalog for special admission and registration policies that apply to them.

PREREQUISITES WILL BE ENFORCED:

Please Note: Prerequisites are cumulative; i.e., some prerequisites have prerequisites of their own that must also be successfully completed prior to enrolling in a course. Students are expected to complete those courses with a "C" or better. Incomplete grades and "D" grades in prerequisite courses do not constitute successful completion. Students must not register for 300 level business courses unless they have met all prerequisites and requirements to declare a business major or minor. This includes a 2.50 GPA in the Foundation Courses.

All students, including students at large, are responsible for complying with the published prerequisites and other registration requirements. Class registration lists will be monitored and checked. Note that a student may advance register for a course in an upcoming semester while enrolled in a prerequisite course in the current semester, but must complete the prerequisite with a "C" or better to remain registered for the upcoming semester.

Students who have taken prerequisite courses at other institutions must have their transcripts evaluated by the Office of Program Advisement in the College of Business and Management. If students have not already done so, they should consult with the Program Advisors immediately.

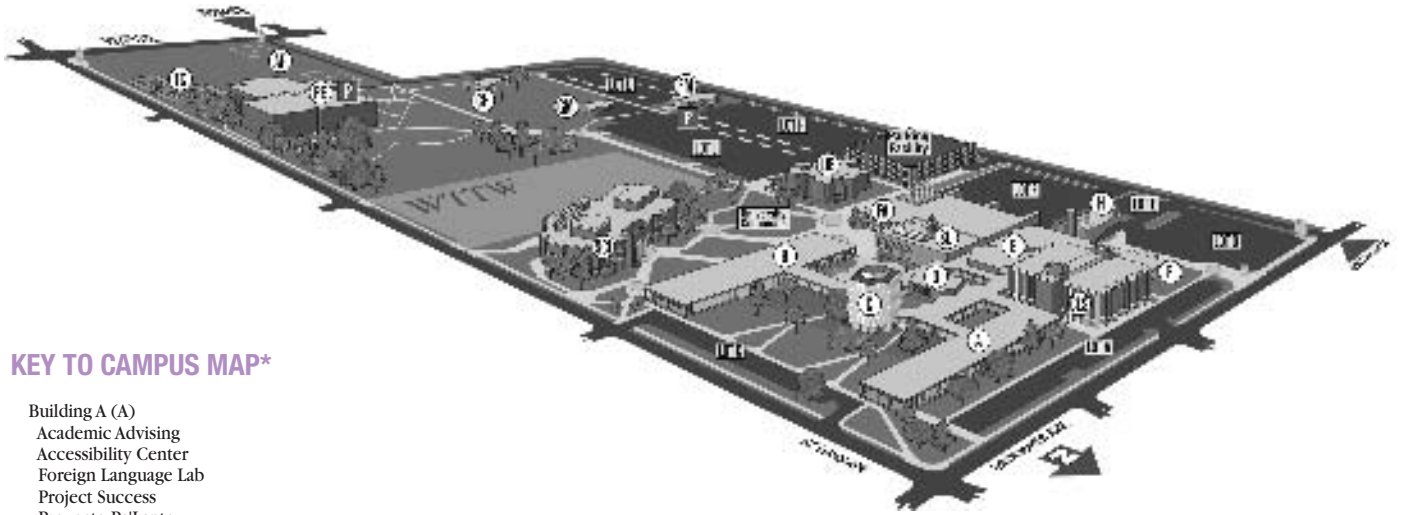
