Good evening, everyone, it is a pleasure for me to stand before you today to share a little about my experience in the MACTL program. We live in a fast-paced world, and I have to say, if there was anything positive that resulted from the pandemic, it forced me to pause and reflect. I found myself questioning what is next and how will I do that. Looking back today, I couldn't be happier with my decision to enroll in this program.

I have received several opportunities on both a professional and personal level. I work at the Museum of Science and Industry. After receiving the Human Research CITI certification (required for Seminar I), I worked with our Research and Evaluation team on a Cultural Institution Belonging Study. I was later promoted to Outreach Programs and Events Manager, where I collaborate to implement new STEM career exposure programming for youth. One of our upcoming events will feature Katya Echazarreta, the first Mexican - born woman to go to space!

On a personal level, I am a product of Chicago Public Schools and have worked with multiple non-profit organizations whose missions align with providing resources to underserved communities. I was recognized during Urban Alliance's 25th Anniversary celebration with former President Obama due to the impact of my work. The MACTL program also required us to conduct a research study. It was an excellent opportunity to address an important topic in my personal life, the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrival (DACA) program. Not only because I am DACAmented myself but because the data would elevate the impact it has on DACAmented individuals' lives. It was my opportunity to raise their voices.

Being here today is a result of surpassing many challenges. We've had family and friends motivating us along the way, so I would like to briefly thank my parents, who are present but didn't know I would be speaking. Mami y Papi, gracias a ustedes hoy estoy aqui. Mis logros son fruto de sus esfuerzos. Hoy los celebro a ustedes y espero esten orgullosos de lo que sus sacrificios han obtenido.

I hope that as we all look back at what we have accomplished, we recognize that our passion for our work led us all here. We created safe and welcoming spaces where we talked about the challenging yet REAL issues affecting our classrooms and communities. We learned to listen, reflect, communicate, and collaborate to improve our work. I am sure we will all continue to share our commitment as we strive for social change and educational inclusiveness. I want to end by quoting Jose Antonio Tijerino, CEO of the Hispanic Heritage Foundation, "You are not lucky to be here. The world needs your perspective. They are lucky to have you."

Program Options

Community Leader Concentration

This option provides knowledge and skills that foster leadership in ethical and culturally sensitive public engagement; acknowledges and considers the complexities of local and global communities; promotes collaborating with schools to empower communities; and leverages community assets to promote social justice and equity.

Teacher Leader Concentration

This option provides knowledge and skills related to leadership, peer mentoring and professional development; promotes positive school culture that focuses on achievement; uses data to improve educational outcomes. Focusing on social justice and the strengths of diversity, this concentration leads to the ISBE-recognized Teacher Leader Endorsement in addition to the master's degree.

Teacher Leader Endorsement (non-degree)

This option offers a professional development opportunity for teachers who already have a M.A. and an Illinois Teaching License to increase their leadership, peer mentoring and job responsibilities by earning the ISBE recognized Teacher Leader Endorsement.

The core courses will help students:

- Build a working knowledge of social and racial justice as it relates to curriculum development, schooling, and leadership within schools and/or communities,
- Create connections between communities and schools in an effort to form partnerships that benefit all members of the neighborhood (students, teachers, parents/guardians, and families).
- Connect theory to practice and develop as future community and teacher leaders who are sensitive to how multiple identities, social location, and circumstances impact youth, educators, and neighborhoods.
