Greetings CAS community,

Now and then I hear academic leaders, even at Northeastern, question the relevance of programs in the CAS, and yet it seems so obvious our programs are vital for preparing students to do the work of creating a clean and habitable environment to sustain our lives, of figuring out how we will feed each other and fuel our world, of helping us communicate with each other across cultures, of resolving conflict, of creating a beautiful world, of understanding our history and the social systems we've created, and more. I could go on.



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FROM THE DEAN

While all of our programs prepare students for meaningful careers doing the practical work to meet our collective needs (our Music Education program has a 100% job placement rate for our graduates, for example), we also take on the biggest questions facing us as a people, as our GHRAD Center demonstrates.

This Women's History and Disability Awareness Month, it is apt to mention as well how vital our Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies program is to preparing students for doing the work of the world. Since the Supreme Court's Dobbs decision, women in the U.S. are enduring intensified assaults on their health and well-being, on their very lives, being denied basic reproductive health care.

One often hears questions about the relevance of Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies programs. And yet a cursory look at the state of our world and, specifically, our workplaces, should confirm for anybody the necessity of such programs. And let's not forget that the U.S. is yet to pass the Equal Rights Amendment, which simply states that "equality of rights under the law shall not be abridged by the United States or any state on account of sex." That as a culture and people we don't endorse that statement . . . well, that should give us all pause about our commitment to basic egalitarian values.

I am thankful for the work the CAS does to prepare students for meaningful careers and rewarding lives while working to make this planet habitable and humane for all. Enjoy the latest CAS Connections!



FACULTY HIGHLIGHT

Dr. Ana Nieves- Associate Professor

ART + DESIGN DEPARTMENT





Dr. Nieves, an Associate Professor of Art History in the Art + Design Department, specializes in the art and architecture of the Americas, specifically on the artistic traditions of the Peruvian south coast. Dr. Nieves has taught a number of classes for NEIU ranging from General Education classes (Introduction to Art History) through graduate-level courses offering, specifically a class titled Latin American Literatures and Cultures (taught entirely in Spanish!) for the World Languages and Cultures Department, as part of the MA in Latin American Literatures and Cultures.

Dr. Nieves organized a study abroad trip (for NEIU students) to Peru as part of a class on Andean Art and Architecture. Students were able to visit Lima and Cuzco where they were able to explore museums and archaeological sites. Dr. Nieves has regularly conducted research in the South Coast of Peru, where she regularly publishes and presents her work. In fact, Dr. Nieves recently exhibited her work at the Museo Julio C. Tello de Paracas in Paracas, Peru where the exhibit was, in many ways, a culmination of her years of field work in the Nasca and Palpa Valleys, specifically her photographic work through the process of Reflectance Transformation Imaging and photogrammetry.

In addition to being an internationally recognized scholar, Dr. Nieves' work was honored by two NEIU Excellence Awards in research. Relatedly, for many years, Dr. Nieves organized a lecture series that focused on the Art of the Americas, an important series and ever more so for an HSI.

Finally, Dr. Nieves has been instrumental in her role as a faculty member on the planning committee for the annual John Albazi Student Research and Creative Activities Symposium, one of the most special days of the academic year for our students, where they are able to showcase their scholarly activities by disseminating their projects with the rest of the NEIU community.

My name is Ana Torres; I am the second oldest of eight siblings. Growing up in a traditional Mexican household challenged my parents and me. I have been in love with school for as long as I can remember. When I was younger, I used to cry during summer break. I begged my mother to enroll me in a summer school program, and she always did.

My journey with NEIU began in 2014 when I got accepted. I graduated with an Associates degree from Richard J. Daley Community College in 2013. I started to take classes at NEIU in 2017. You see, I am a former DACA recipient, and paying out of pocket for school is quite expensive, especially when you have a family of your own. I have been a part-time student, full-time mom, a wife, and managed three health clinics.

My life is always on the go. I am a senior at NEIU, and my major is Justice Studies. I will graduate on May 10, 2024, and I will begin my journey to become an attorney. I want to help our immigrant communities, especially those like me. DACA recipients who have been in this country and are contributing to it all their lives. Families that cannot afford an immigration attorney or are looking for someone who will understand their struggle and sympathize with them. That is my main goal and dream. Four years from now, I will be an attorney.

NEIU was the perfect university for me. I loved the flexibility in the hours; as mentioned earlier, I am a full-time employee and cannot attend morning classes. Also, the professors I have met have been of great support. I cannot tell you enough how blessed I have been to meet and interact with them. From Dr. De La Torre, Dr. Nancy Mathews, and everyone else. NEIU has allowed me to complete my education, and I will always be thankful to everyone who has helped me.

Something interesting about me? I honestly do not know. I am always busy running from work to school and back home to my family and two Golden doodles. I can tell you that my daughter and I will be graduating from the university this year. It is funny because she graduates on May 5 and claims I will steal her thunder.

I want to encourage all DACA recipients and anyone wishing to enroll in the university. It is one of the best investments you can make for yourself and your family. It requires persistence and patience, but if you stick with it, everything will be worth it. 

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES STUDENT ADVISORY BOARD

Northeastern Illinois University's College of Arts and Sciences (CAS) is interested in assembling a **Student Advisory Board** to provide the Dean's Office with **insights into student experiences** in the CAS and to raise issues/concerns regarding processes on campus.

Advisory board members are also expected to be available a few times a semester to promote the college and provide a student voice at various events during the year. The board will consist of 15 undergraduate students (and two alternates) representing a variety of CAS majors and life experiences. The advisory group will meet approximately three times a semester with the CAS Deans and may be asked to provide feedback on urgent matters between meetings.

The Student Advisory Board provides students with leadership opportunities, centers students in CAS decision-making, affirms and acknowledges student experiences and allows students to help share and improve processes. Students should be able to commit to one academic year and will not be able to serve more than two years on the board.

Merit Scholarship Application

The College of Arts and Sciences provides a limited number of Merit Tuition Scholarships for interested and deserving undergraduates (Second Bachelor's candidates are not eligible) within the College of Arts and Sciences. These scholarships are generally granted for three to six credit hours and students **MUST** be enrolled at least half-time.

Scholarships will be granted on the basis of the student's intended major, status, intended Career/Educational Goals, transcripts and/or ACT/SAT scores, and letter of recommendation.

To be considered for selection, applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Transfer and NEIU continuing students must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.25
- Students who have earned 45 credit hours at NEIU must be declared majors in the College of Arts and Sciences. Transfer students with over 45 total hours must declare their major in the College of Arts and Sciences by their second semester at NEIU.
- Entering Freshmen must be in the top 15% of their graduating class or have a minimum ACT score of 24 or SAT of 1110.

Applicants must submit a complete application including:

- The name and email address of a faculty member who has agreed to complete a faculty recommendation form
- Official college transcript (NEIU transcripts may be unofficial), OR an official high school transcript reflecting class standing and ACT/SAT scores.

This award may be withdrawn in instances of substantiated academic misconduct or other violations of University standards pertaining to proper student conduct.

Application Deadlines:

Fall: May 15th

Spring: October 1st

Summer: February 1st

The College Merit Tuition Scholarship Committee will review all applications and notify applicants, approximately, one month after the application deadline. Incomplete applications will not be considered.



The next CAS Undergraduate Merit Scholarship Deadline is May 15th for Fall 2024.



Dr. Kathryn Sánchez

Characterization of the inflammasome in a model of neurodegeneration (CLN2 mouse model)

Dr. Kathryn Sánchez is a Postdoctoral Fellow at the University of Chicago, specializing in microglia, the innate immune cells of the central nervous system. Her research journey began as an NIH MBRS-RISE and BP-ENDURE fellow at New Mexico State University, where she developed a keen interest in neuroscience. After earning her Bachelor's degree in Biology, she pursued a Ph.D. at Georgetown University, focusing on microglia's role in Parkinson's disease. Dr. Sánchez identified inflammatory proteins released by microglia, specifically matrix-metalloproteinases, perpetuating chronic inflammation. In her subsequent post-doctoral role at the University of New Mexico, she investigated inflammasome activation and its impact on matrix-metalloproteinases in Alzheimer's disease. Now, in her second post-doctoral position at the University of Chicago, Dr. Sánchez continues her research on inflammasome-mediated matrix-metalloproteinase release, exploring its role in Batten's disease.



Dr. Kevin Muñoz Forti

Phenotypic and Metabolic Heterogeneity of Cancer-Associated Fibroblasts

Dr. Muñoz Forti holds a Bachelor's degree in Biomedicine from the University of Puerto Rico at Ponce, where he was an NIH RISE fellow and studied the kinetics of lipid exchange and synthesis of novel antibiotic compounds. He obtained his Master's degree in Biotechnology from the Pontific Catholic University of Puerto Rico, where he studied the cytotoxic effects of calcium sulfide nanostructures in models of lung and breast cancer. As an NIH T32 fellow at the University of Missouri, he obtained his PhD in Biochemistry, where he studied the role of nucleotide receptors in host anti-tumor immune responses in oral cancer. Currently, Kevin is a post-doctoral NIH K12 fellow at the University of Chicago, where, as a member of the Schwörer lab, he studies the role of fibroblasts in pancreatic ductal adenocarcinoma and fibrosis, focusing on metabolic heterogeneity.

Tuition and Fees

Dual Enrollment Program students receive a NEIU scholarship waiver to cover the cost of attendance for one class. For 2023-24, three (3) credits at NEIU costs \$1,547.85

Students are responsible for their own classroom fees/books/materials. They are not covered by NEIU scholarship waiver.

- High school students who have completed 10th grade in good standing. Priority given to students interested in attending NEIU full time after graduation.
- Cumulative unweighted grade point average of 2.85
- Signed recommendation form from the principal or guidance counselor
- Official transcript
- Parental consent forms
- Student and parent/ legal guardian must participate in a mandatory orientation. Orientation dates 6 PM 3/20, 3/21, 4/2 (following NEIU Open House 3-6 PM), 4/3, 4/16, 4/17, 4/24, 4/25, 5/7, 5/8. Preregistration is required. Orientations may be canceled if no preregistrations for that date.

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
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
