FROM THE DEAN

Greetings, CAS community,

Counter to T.S. Eliot's characterization of April as the "cruellest month" in his famous poem *The Wasteland*, for the College of Arts and Sciences at Northeastern April is a vibrant and celebratory month, featuring hooding, honors, and awards ceremonies that recognize the achievements of our students and, by extension, our accomplished faculty in the College, as we barrel down the homestretch of the Spring term toward commencement.

I want to open my reflections this month by shining light on and extending congratulations to Dr. Cindy Voisine, the well-deserving recipient of the 2024 Bernard J. Brommel Distinguished Research Professor award, the most prestigious honor we bestow on NEIU faculty in recognition of their outstanding research contributions to our world. Her research has been recognized by and made significant contributions to the international scientific community. Dr. Voisine uses the worm *Caenorhabditis elegans* to investigate the role of molecules and the nervous system in development, aging, and human diseases, fostering a greater understanding of the fundamentals of diseases such as prostate cancer, ALS, Parkinson's, and tuberculosis. Not only does her research have a broad global impact, it is an incredible benefit to our students who have the opportunity to participate in her research as undergraduates!

Indeed, as I reflect on our students' growth in their time at NEIU and all that our faculty do to cultivate our students' capacities so they can impact the world in the work they do, what stands out to me is a hallmark of the CAS student experience—and of our faculty expertise—that is perhaps less highlighted when people recognize NEIU's excellence: the high-level, globally-impactful research in which our faculty, such as Dr. Voisine, are engaged and in which they involve our graduate and undergraduate students.

Our undergraduate students have the opportunity to work with top scholars doing world-class research, a rare opportunity in higher education and one typically reserved for doctoral students at other major research universities. Our students get this experience because of faculty like Dr. Voisine, and they move on to top graduate schools, where they often find themselves better prepared than students from so-called "elite" institutions, and rewarding careers because of these experiences.

FROM THE DEAN CONTINUED...

We don't just set up students for success; they succeed now. At the recent Illinois Louis Stokes Alliance for Minority Participation (ILSAMP) conference, a program funded by the National Science Foundation to increase minority participation in STEM disciplines, 7 NEIU students won awards for best poster/oral presentation. Congratulations to Jonathan Scott Haines, Vincent Lotesto, Nathaniel Santiago, Stephanie Pedraza Marin, Favour Ogukwe, Krishna Parikh, and Sorayya Nazari! And Vincent Lotesto also won First Place at the 2024 Chicago Society for Neuroscience Meeting at Loyola University Chicago last March 1.

Faculty doing great research shape students who do great research, especially in the College of Arts and Sciences at NEIU. If you want to see how, come visit us this April 26 at NEIU for the 31st John Sargon Albazi Student Symposium, showcasing the research and creative activities of our undergraduate and graduate students.

Education is not just about assimilating received knowledge; it's about participating in the production of new knowledge and figuring out how to solve the problems facing us as a people in order to better the lives of all and direct social development toward greater humanity.

While NEIU is a small state school nestled in a humble residential neighborhood on the northside, our faculty are world-class scholars engaging in impactful and internationally-recognized research. And our students at both the undergraduate and graduate levels benefit from the incredible experience of having opportunities to participate with our faculty in this research.

I often hear people question whether a college education is "worth it." I ask back, "Worth it for whom?" Our society needs universities like NEIU to produce the next generation of thoughtful and skilled people with the expertise to do the work of the world to help meet our collective needs and address our pressing challenges.

Let me suggest a college education is worth it for all our sakes. Enjoy the spring!

My minor helped empower and validate my identity as well as my struggles. My minor is what led me to discover that I am a Social Worker.

Anything else that you think is important that we haven't asked?

I want to send a special thank you to the staff at the Pedroso Center. Thank you for providing a safe space where I could feel seen, heard, validated, and empowered. Thank you for not taking a "neutral stance" on social justice issues. The Pedroso center and my Women and Gender study classes taught me the many ways that advocacy could look like and how to hold space for others during vulnerable moments. This and other feminist ideologies I have adapted into my practice with the goal to validate and empower the marginalized and oppressed people that I serve.

I also want to thank the teachers that spent a few minutes after class ended to let me know of the potential they saw in me. It's because of passionate, empathetic, and supportive teachers that I was able to continue on to graduate school and now a Therapist for Adults.

At the age of 29 I began to work on my bachelor's degree. I am a first generation college student, I am a product of immigrants, and a Queer Latinx non-binary professional. Part of my success is due to the amazing education I received from NEIU.

Early on as a child the bar was set low for me especially because I graduated from one of the poorest performing districts in the state of Illinois at the time. I was not expected to go to college nor attain a profession. I internalized the belief that I was not smart enough and sought out mental health services to unlearn some of those self-limiting beliefs when I began working on my associate's degree.

My hopes is that my story can serve as a small beacon of hope for any student that doesn't believe that they are capable of attaining a college degree or a profession due to their background or identity. I hope my story reminds NEIU student's the importance of having a dream. Finally, I hope to read of your success story too one day. Yes we can! Si Se Puede!





THE LOSAH CENTER OF HOPE/ CENTRO DE ESPERANZA





- Patricia Aguado (current SWK faculty) is on the board for the future Humboldt Park center





COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES STUDENT ADVISORY BOARD

Northeastern Illinois University's College of Arts and Sciences (CAS) is interested in assembling a **Student Advisory Board** to provide the Dean's Office with **insights into student experiences** in the CAS and to raise issues/concerns regarding processes on campus.

Advisory board members are also expected to be available a few times a semester to promote the college and provide a student voice at various events during the year. The board will consist of 15 undergraduate students (and two alternates) representing a variety of CAS majors and life experiences. The advisory group will meet approximately three times a semester with the CAS Deans and may be asked to provide feedback on urgent matters between meetings.

The Student Advisory Board provides students with leadership opportunities, centers students in CAS decision-making, affirms and acknowledges student experiences and allows students to help share and improve processes. Students should be able to commit to one academic year and will not be able to serve more than two years on the board.

Merit Scholarship Application

The College of Arts and Sciences provides a limited number of Merit Tuition Scholarships for interested and deserving undergraduates (Second Bachelor's candidates are not eligible) within the College of Arts and Sciences. These scholarships are generally granted for three to six credit hours and students **MUST** be enrolled at least half-time.

Scholarships will be granted on the basis of the student's intended major, status, intended Career/Educational Goals, transcripts and/or ACT/SAT scores, and letter of recommendation.

To be considered for selection, applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Transfer and NEIU continuing students must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.25
- Students who have earned 45 credit hours at NEIU must be declared majors in the College of Arts and Sciences. Transfer students with over 45 total hours must declare their major in the College of Arts and Sciences by their second semester at NEIU.
- Entering Freshmen must be in the top 15% of their graduating class or have a minimum ACT score of 24 or SAT of 1110.

Applicants must submit a complete application including:

- The name and email address of a faculty member who has agreed to complete a faculty recommendation form
- Official college transcript (NEIU transcripts may be unofficial), OR an official high school transcript reflecting class standing and ACT/SAT scores.

This award may be withdrawn in instances of substantiated academic misconduct or other violations of University standards pertaining to proper student conduct.

Application Deadlines:

Fall: May 15th

Spring: October 1st

Summer: February 1st

The College Merit Tuition Scholarship Committee will review all applications and notify applicants, approximately, one month after the application deadline. Incomplete applications will not be considered.



The next CAS Undergraduate Merit Scholarship Deadline is May 15th for Fall 2024.
