The CAS this year has launched an historic campaign to raise \$150,000 to create a strong foundation for sustainable support for these transformative experiences. The campaign will run through the end of 2024 and, since our launch on Proud to Be NEIU Day, we are at about ten percent of the overall goal!

"As a first-generation college graduate, I never thought I'd be part of academic spaces where I had something to teach to others... However, I met amazing professors and friends whose support nurtured the academic in me.

I had the opportunity to be a part of local and out-of-state research conferences during my last couple of years at NEIU, and those moments profoundly transformed me. I felt a deep sense of pride as I shared my work for the first time at NEIU's Student Symposium. Encouraged by my professors to submit my proposal and supported by my peers in the audience, it felt right to be up there. That type of support in an academic setting was so important to me. It reassured my confidence and passion for literature.

Additionally, presenting at the Sigma Tau Delta International Honor Society conference in St. Louis alongside my peers was a dream come true. I had always heard of students having opportunities to present their work off campus, but never thought that would be me simply because of the financial costs.

I am grateful we were able to raise money to make this trip possible because the moments we shared as a collective were special. We presented our findings to students from all across the country, listened to authors discuss their process, and learned from other students, who like us, were excited to be there. It was a defining moment that reaffirmed my belief in the power of being in community.

My biggest regret as an undergrad is not being a part of these spaces sooner."

## FACULTY HIGHLIGHT

Dr. Stacey Goguen

PHILOSOPHY + WOMEN'S, GENDER, & SEXUALITY STUDIES

Dr. Goguen is interested in many different research topics, but most revolve around the question: When should we trust what someone tells us? And what should we do when we don't know who or what to trust? Dr. Goguen shared that she first thought about this question when she was in elementary school and got accused of cheating on a test. Even though she hadn't cheated, she realized there was no way the teacher could know that, so she began thinking, what should the teacher do? Now, Dr. Goguen studies bias, stereotypes, disinformation, and ignorance, but they all come back to questions like: If someone you trust says something you can't believe, what should you do: stop trusting the person, or start believing the incredible?

Dr. Goguen was originally planning to specialize in philosophy of physics (because the wave/particle duality and quantum entanglement are "freakin cool and strange".) Then she discovered social psychology and feminist philosophy, and that changed her life. Dr. Goguen realized that some things she had taken for granted (Do we know our own thoughts and intentions? Do our social identities influence what we know and notice?) might have some wildly different answers than what she had previously assumed to be true.

According to Dr. Goguen, her favorite thing about NEIU is that there are so many people here (students, staff, faculty) who genuinely care about contributing to their communities and don't want to settle for what's comfortable and easy--they want to do what's hard and transformative. They want to keep growing and learning. That's a wonderful space to be in.

When Dr. Goguen isn't in front of class or serving on a committee; you might find her playing games (board games, video games, etc.) She can run eight different TTRPG systems! Dr. Goguen also likes learning new recipes to cook, and walking by the river.

## Economics Program Information

for Prospective Students



Economics is the social science that analyzes how to make the best choices with limited resources, often using **data analysis and cutting-edge methods**. These important decisions are made by consumers, businesses, governments of all sizes, and nations. The Economics program at Northeastern Illinois University offers courses leading to a Bachelor of Arts degree.

#### What can I do with an Economics degree?

Economics graduates often work in a analytical and financial jobs, and can be found at all levels of business and other organizations. Courses in statistics and data analysis often help students gain useful skills. As of 2021, **new graduates** with a bachelor's degree in Economics enjoy a median starting salary around \$62,000/year. Many jobs with the title of Economist require a Master's degree or a Ph.D., and the median salary is \$105,630 (U.S. Bureou of Labor Statistics, 2021).

NEIU Economics graduates have been successful, finding employment at major firms, investment groups, and banks; starting businesses; or studying in graduate programs.

#### THE ECONOMICS MAJOR AT NEIU

The 36-credit major requires six core courses and six elective courses. The department currently has specializations in urban economics, applied macroeconomics, and finance. Courses in data analysis provide essential skills and are offered every term.

Economics is also the perfect complement to disciplines such as political science, geography, history, mathematics, and business. The department offers an 18-credit minor for students in other majors.

## **CAS SCHOLARSHIPS WEBSITE LINK**

#### Merit Scholarship Application

The College of Arts and Sciences provides a limited number of Merit Tuition Scholarships for interested and deserving undergraduates (Second Bachelor's candidates are not eligible) within the College of Arts and Sciences. These scholarships are generally granted for three to six credit hours and students MUST be enrolled at least half-time. Scholarships will be granted on the basis of the student's intended major, status, intended Career/Educational Goals, transcripts and/or ACT/SAT scores, and letter of recommendation.

#### To be considered for selection, applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Transfer and NEIU continuing students must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.25
- Students who have earned 45 credit hours at NEIU must be declared majors in the College of Arts and Sciences. Transfer students with over 45 total hours must declare their major in the College of Arts and Sciences by their second semester at NEIU.
- Entering Freshmen must be in the top 15% of their graduating class or have a minimum ACT score of 24 or SAT of 1110.

#### Applicants must submit a complete application including:

- The name and email address of a faculty member who has agreed to complete a faculty recommendation form
- Official college transcript (NEIU transcripts may be unofficial), OR an official high school transcript reflecting class standing and ACT/SAT scores.

This award may be withdrawn in instances of substantiated academic misconduct or other violations of University standards pertaining to proper student conduct.

#### Application Deadlines:

Fall: May 15th Spring: October 1st Summer: February 1st

The College Merit Tuition Scholarship Committee will review all applications and notify applicants, approximately, one month after the application deadline. Incomplete applications will not be considered.



The next CAS Undergraduate Merit Scholarship Deadline is May 15th for Fall 2024.

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

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
