"Speak for Yourself: Style and Spirit in Leon Forrest's Divine Days"

Close readings of Leon Forrest's epic comic novel *Divine Days* (1992) demonstrate the interrelationship of religion, modernism, and autobiography. Forrest's religious roots in Roman Catholicism and evangelical storefront Protestantism provide evidence of the interrelatedness of style and spirituality in *Divine Days*. Forrest's stylistic indebtedness to William Faulkner defines a strong connection between Forrest and modernism. Forrest's autobiographical "presence" and the generic form of "periautography," reveal his complication of generic differences between fiction and autobiography. I explore the interrelationship between stylistic performance and religious rhetoric and show how Forrest's aesthetic principle of reinvention is presented as a model for spiritual and social salvation.
