1. What year are you?


I am currently in the last semester of my senior year

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT: LYNDA GIBSON

1. What year did you graduate?

I graduated in May 2011. In addition to being a Psychology major, while at NEIU I was in the University Honors Program and McNair Scholars Program. During my time at NEIU, I made a conscious effort to participate in activities and select courses that would help me move toward my long-term goal, which was to become a clinical child psychologist and conduct research that focused on risk and resiliency factors for minority families. For my capstone, I worked with David Farmer to complete a research project at the Institute for Juvenile Research/Disruptive Behavior Disorder's Clinic. I strongly believe that having this early research and clinical experience was extremely helpful when applying to graduate programs.



2. What graduate program are you in?

After graduating from NEIU, I enrolled in the dual Master's/PhD Clinical Psychology program at Illinois Institute of Technology. While in graduate school, I also worked at the University of Illinois Chicago on a grant-funded project that focuses on the implementation and dissemination of trauma-informed protocols. As part of my dissertation research, I created the Preschool Community Violence Awareness Project which is a program designed to evaluate the impact that community violence exposure has on early child development. As part of the last requirement for my PhD program, I am currently completing my pre-doctoral internship placement with the Dallas Independent School District. I am also in the process of interviewing for postdoctoral fellowship positions within academic medical center settings where I can continue my research and clinical work focused on early development, trauma exposure, and child psychopathology.

3. How did NEIU prepare you for graduate school and/or work?

I doubt that I would be where I am today without the people and opportunities that were available at NEIU. The ongoing mentorship that has been provided by several of the faculty in the psychology department has been extremely valuable in helping to chart my next steps and make long-term career decisions.

4. What advice would you give undergraduate students?

The best advice that I can give is to build multiple connections within the department and throughout the campus. While in undergrad, I completed research projects with several faculty and participated in activities across the university. Building these relationships has proved to be beneficial when applying to graduate school, looking for jobs, etc. One of the things that I have enjoyed the most about being an alum of the psychology department is being able to work with current students. Most recently, I have had students work with me on some of my own projects as a way to get early research experience. In addition, I have been fortunate to work with a few programs throughout the university to serve as a mentor for first-generation minority college students who are interested in attending graduate school.
