


## Comparison of Student Enrollment and FTE



Total enrollment in Fall, 2008 decreased by 3.9%; at the undergraduate level, enrollment fell by 1.4% and at the graduate level, there was a 12.8% decline in enrollments.

Among the newly enrolled undergraduates, new freshman enrollment increased by 6.3%, while the number of new transfer students fell by 3.7%. Total student FTE also declined by 2.0%.

## Comparison of Student Credit Hours by Level and by College

Total credit hour productivity slightly decreased this fall by 1.7%. The largest decrease was in graduate credit hours which fell 10.8%. Among the three colleges, the College of Education was the only college to experience an increase in credit hours generated (2.3%).

Compared with last fall, the student profile has changed very little. Nine out of ten new freshmen and nearly six out of ten new transfer students are enrolled full-time. Members of underrepresented groups make up 65% of the new freshmen cohort and nearly 43% of new transfer students.
