

Comparison of Student Enrollment and FTE




Total enrollment dropped 2% (N=224) from Spring 2008 to Spring 2009. Most of this drop occurred in the Graduate School, where enrollment dropped 6% (N=151) vs. a drop in undergraduate enrollment of less than 1% (N=73).

Furthermore, a gain in upper division enrollment of 1% (N=42) was cancelled out by a loss in lower division enrollment of 4% (N=115), resulting in the net change of less than 1% for undergraduate enrollment.

Overall, there was little change in total FTE between Spring 2008 and Spring 2009 (.1%, N=7). Looking across undergraduate divisions, a drop in graduate FTE of 5% (N=50) was countered by an increase in undergraduate FTE of 1% (N=43).

Comparison of Student Credit Hours by Level and by College



*Total Credit Hours includes Honors, NSEP, and non-traditional credit hours.

The number of student credit hours held steady from Spring 2008 to Spring 2009, with a slight increase of .05% (N=48). An increase in undergraduate credit hours of 1% (N=653) was countered by a decrease in graduate credit hours (5%, N=605) resulting in little net change.

The gain in undergraduate student credit hours was limited to upper division (3%, N=1,568); this was countered slightly by a loss in lower division (3%, N=915). There was little change in credit hours across the Colleges. Academic Development realized a gain of 4% (N=147).
