




Comparison of Student Enrollment and FTE



- In spring 2006, overall student enrollment and student FTE showed a slight increase of 1.1% and 1.2%, respectively.
- An analysis of changes that have taken place in the spring semesters over a five-year period shows modest increases for important institutional indicators.
 - Between spring 2002 and spring 2006, overall enrollment increased 5.8%, undergraduate enrollment grew slightly more at 7.3%, and overall student FTE grew by 5.8%.
 - During the same period, student credit hour productivity increased at the undergraduate and graduate levels by 5.5% and 7.2%, respectively.



Comparison of Student Credit Hours by Level and by College

*Total Credit Hours includes Honors, NSEP, and non-traditional credit hours.

At the College level, the most notable change was found in the College of Business and Management (COBM). Over the five-year period the COBM increased by 38.1% the number of student credit hours it generates in the spring term.
